

MADMAN SUSPECT HELD AT SEATTLE

SEATTLE, July 11 (AP)—Sheriff Gordon Nicks said today that a Seattle man was being investigated in connection with the case of a madman who last month ran amok north of Seattle, killing one person and seriously wounding two others.

The man, the sheriff said, has been held in the Grant county jail since Monday morning and a sanity hearing scheduled for today has been deferred pending further investigation.

Sheriff Nicks and Sheriff Tom Cannon of Chelan county arrested the suspect Monday near Quincy, Nicks said, after the man had pulled a gun on the two officers. Nicks explained they had seen a car parked near the highway with a man in it and had merely stopped to see what the trouble was.

Despite the apparent age discrepancy, Nicks said the man, as nearly as he could tell, answered closely the description of the elderly madman who June 23 killed Edward A. La Fountain and critically wounded R. E. Bull and Mrs. Virginia La Fountain on the highway north of Seattle.

The sheriff said the suspect was about 6 feet tall, sallow complexioned, had a gold tooth in the left side of his mouth, looked much older than his reported age and when he was arrested his hair had been recently powdered to gray it.

The prisoner had been in Grant county early this summer, but returned to Seattle shortly before June 23, Nicks said.

The left Seattle Saturday, the officer added, and drove until his car broke down Saturday night. Then he roamed the hills around Quincy until he was arrested Monday.

Nicks said he had back-tracked the man's course and at one place found a four-foot trench behind a barricade of rocks containing a loaded 30-30 rifle and an empty .25 calibre automatic pistol cartridge box. Also in the trench, the officers said, was an old blue and a pair of gray pants, with needle holes on one leg indicating that a patch might have been removed.

Since being brought to jail, the man has threatened to blow up the place, kill the officers and has charged them with attempting to poison him, Nicks said.

Although the Seattle slayings have not been mentioned to him, the suspect repeatedly has discussed the case with other prisoners in the jail, the officer added.

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., July 11 (AP)—Victor Woodrick, 23-year-old army flying cadet, unintentionally matched the best in circus entertainment Thursday when he somersaulted out of a training plane 500 feet in the air, landed on the tail assembly and rode the craft to the ground cowboy style.

"I wasn't scared," Woodrick, from Three Oaks, Mich., said last night. "I guess I didn't have time to get scared."

"I don't know exactly what happened to me, but I landed on my back right in front of the tail and facing the rear. I stayed that way while the plane landed. Then I jumped down."

Men Over-Disciplined for Hooting at Girls, Charge

WASHINGTON, July 11 (AP)—The war department has directed Lieutenant General Ben Lear to make a full factual report on his order disciplining a battalion of troops which yoo-hoed at girl golfers at Memphis, Tenn.

Major General Robert C. Richardson Jr., told reporters that the second army commander had been called on for a "statement of fact of his side of the case," in accord with a policy not to prejudge a case.

General Lear required the soldiers to make a long march, part of it at foot, as punishment for their behavior.

General Richardson said General Lear's explanation would be made public. He said the incident did not call for a formal court of inquiry.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 11 (AP)—Stern-visaged Lieut. Gen. Ben Lear has replied to congressional criticism of the pennance march he ordered for yoo-hoing troops with a declaration that as long as he remains second army commander "soldierly standards of conduct will be demanded of all individuals in uniform."

Gen. Lear telegraphed Rep. Kilday (D-Tex.), member of a special house subcommittee investigating personnel matters in the defense program, who yesterday wired Lear he contemplated a resolution to investigate Lear's "severe punishment" of some 350 soldiers for yelling at golfers as they passed through Memphis Sunday. The general said his action was "neither unjust nor severe."

Lear's response was released last night by second army headquarters here. It said, in part:

"I am responsible for the training of all elements of this (second) army and for raising all elements to the highest attainable standards of conduct and combat efficiency. Nothing less will secure this country's successful defense against thoroughly disciplined, trained and efficiently led hostile forces in case we are attacked . . .

"Loose conduct and rowdiness cannot be tolerated . . . I am responsible also that members of the second army treat the civilian population with respect and consideration . . . The message added the conduct of the group punished with a 150-mile march from Memphis to Camp Robinson, Ark., partly afoot, "was in marked contrast to the soldierly and gentlemanly behavior of the vast majority of men" in the recent Tennessee maneuvers.

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—Rep. Norrell (D-Ark.), saying he had just been advised that Lieut. Gen. Ben Lear "is still on the golf links," suggested in the house today that congress demand an investigation of the officer's disciplining of yoo-hoing troops.

"He is not the kind of general we need, standing on the brink of war," Norrell said. "He apparently is engaged all the time in playing golf."

Rep. Faddis (D-Pa.) replied immediately that it was not a matter for the house, saying that it was not up to congressmen to attempt to regulate army discipline.

Eugene Youth Captured After Weird Rampage

EUGENE, Ore., July 11 (AP)—Authorities today committed 23-year-old Max Babcock of Eugene to the state hospital for the insane to end what they said were weird extortion schemes to get funds for Germany.

Police said Babcock tried to see Mayor Elisha Large and get \$5000 to build "an armored car" to be used in "attacks on California airplane factories."

The youth was reported to have been prevented seeing the mayor at home by Mrs. Large, who slammed a door in Babcock's face when he pulled a gun.

Failing to get money from the mayor, police said Babcock then accosted Dan Bradford of Long Beach, Calif., and forced him at gun point to drive to Corvallis. Police said the youth declared he planned to get \$2000 from a Corvallis bakery.

He was arrested in Corvallis by police and returned to Eugene, where he told authorities he would do "anything" to help the Germans.

CE CONFAB HEARS PROHI PROPOSAL

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 11 (AP)—A campaign for the return of prohibition was proposed to the International Christian Endeavor society in biennial convention Thursday.

"The present national emergency makes even more imperative prompt and decisive action," Dr. Daniel A. Poling of Philadelphia, president of the society which claims 2,000,000 members in the United States and Canada, told 6000 delegates last night. "Alcohol has less than nothing to contribute to the national defense."

Asserting the society faced "a greater task" than it did more than two decades ago before the last World War, Dr. Poling said: "For every saloon of 1911," he said, "there are now at least three similar, or worse, places of liquor sale. There is work for us to do. Here and now we renew our pledge, rededicate ourselves to the solution of the liquor problem, and here we shall make our plans to contribute our maximum service in the interests of a sober America."
