

BILLION FEET OF LUMBER ORDERED

SEATTLE, July 11 (UP) — Nearly a billion feet of lumber for defense industry will be furnished by west coast mills this year, the West Coast Lumbermen's association said Thursday night.

The association also disclosed that the industry is now running at 99.1 per cent of estimated capacity, with an especially heavy demand for high grades and large sizes of lumber unavailable elsewhere.

The industry is operating "under pressure of a tremendous backlog of undelivered orders" which piled up during the recent western Washington CIO woodworkers' strike, the association said.

The association described the withdrawal of intercoastal shipping from normal trade lanes as the most critical situation now facing the industry.

June production each week averaged 157,920,000 board feet, bringing the total for the year to the end of June up to 4,224,342,000 board feet. Unfilled orders at the end of the month stood at 813,088,000 feet.

Train Too Slow; Soldier Attempts To Speed Engine

BRIDGEWATER, Mass., July 11 (AP)—The train was going too slowly to please a husky soldier sitting in one of the ten passenger cars.

So he took the most direct action possible.

Railroad officials related that last night he climbed over the coal tender and into the locomotive cab and there attempted to take over the controls to speed things up.

The engineer and the fireman tussled with the man along a five-mile stretch. The conductor and other members of the crew came to their aid and they halted the train as it pulled into Brockton station.

Jumping from the cab then, the soldier fled but was captured after a short chase. A resident of Bridgewater, where he boarded the train, he was on furlough from Camp Hulen, Tex., and was dressed in civilian clothes.

In district court Thursday, the soldier, Private Walter Pastuski, 19, pleaded guilty to interference with the operation of a public railroad and was sentenced to six months in the house of correction. A drunkenness charge was dropped.

After Pastuski left to begin serving his sentence, his parents announced they would have him file an appeal, provide bail and see to it that he got back to Camp Hulen by Tuesday when his furlough is over.

Use Vegetables Often to Insure Keeping Family's Health at Par

For more vigorous health, you and your family should eat and enjoy more fresh vegetables.

TOMATOES STUFFED WITH SPINACH AND CHEESE (Serves 4 to 6)

Four or 5 good-sized tomatoes, 2 cups chopped cooked spinach, 1 cup thick white sauce, 1 cup grated American cheese, salt, pepper, 1 cup fine soft bread crumbs.

Cut a slice from the stem end of each tomato and scoop out the soft portion. Combine the spinach, white sauce, and 1 cup of the cheese; season with salt and pepper. Fill the tomatoes with the spinach mixture and cover with the crumbs which have been mixed with the rest of the cheese. Place in a baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for about 25 minutes or until the tomatoes are done. Be careful not to let them overcook or they will lose their shape.

SCALLOPED ONIONS AND GREEN PEPPERS (Serves 4 to 6)

Six medium-sized mild onions, 3 medium-sized green peppers, 4 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 1/2 cups milk, salt, pepper, buttered crumbs.

Cook the onions in boiling salted water until tender. Drain, cut in halves and place in a baking dish. Remove the seeds from the peppers, cut in halves lengthwise. Cook in the butter until softened. Stir in the flour, add the milk gradually and cook until thick. Season with salt and pepper, pour over the onions.

and cover with buttered crumbs. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375° F.) for about 20 minutes.

BAKED STUFFED CUCUMBERS (Serves 4)

Two cucumbers, 2 tablespoons butter or other fat, 1 tablespoon chopped onion, 1 tablespoon of minced parsley, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 1 medium-sized tomato, chopped; salt, pepper, buttered crumbs.

Pare the cucumbers and cut them in halves lengthwise. Scoop out the seedy portion; parboil the shells in lightly salted water for 10 minutes and drain. Heat the butter and cook the onion and parsley in it for a few minutes. Add the crumbs, tomato, and cucumber pulp and season with salt pepper. Cook the mixture for 5 minutes and fill the cucumber shells with it. Cover with buttered crumbs, add a little water to keep the cucumbers from sticking, and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for about 15 minutes.
