DRAIN TUNNEL NEARLY READY FOR CONCRETE

TULELAKE—Outside transitions at the west portal of the reclamation drainage tunnel through the hill west of Tulelake were poured Wednesday by J. A. Tertling and company, and concrete will be blown around the forms inside the tunnel proper in the near future when machinery that has been the cause of delay is repaired. It was announced this week by Willard L. Smith, associate reclamation engineer.

Eighteen yards of concrete were poured in the initial operation, 10 feet of it going inside the portal and the remainder being used for the canal which projects into the prism that will carry water to lower Klamath lake.

All pouring operations will move from west to east, the eastern portal to be finished last. Inside dimension of the tunnel will be 5 feet 9 inches when completed.

The concrete mixture will be blown around the wood and steel forms placed in the tunnel in sections, the units adding to between 500 and 600 feet when all are in place. A crew of about 50 men will be employed during the concrete operations, it was stated at the office of the contracting company. When concrete operations are finished, work will begin on the pump line and the power house.

Pack Your Larder With These Delicious Berry Preserves



Summer muffins taste better with blueberry marmalade.

What's the difference between blueberries and huckleberries? The seeds give the answer. Cut a huckleberry through the center and you'll see 10 large seeds in a ring. Each of these looks like a tiny peach pit and has a bony shell. A blueberry, on the other hand, has many seeds, but they are so tiny and soft that the berry seems practically seedless.

Blueberries, like all other fresh raspberries and blackberries, add small amounts of several of the vitamins to the meal. Keep berries in the refrigerator or dish and cover lightly with wax paper. Wash them just before using.

BLUEBERRY MARMALADE (About 8 glasses)

Three cups prepared fruit, 5 cups sugar, 1 bottle fruit pectin. To prepare fruit, crush thoroughly about 1 pound fully ripe blueberries. Remove skins in quarters from 1 medium orange and 1 medium lemon. Lay quarters flat; shave off and discard about half of white part. With a very sharp knife, cut remaining rind into fine shreds. Add

fruit, solidly packed, into large kettle, flooding each cup with juice, or if necessary, with water.

Bring to a boil and boil gently 5 minutes. Remove from fire and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for just 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Pour quickly. Paraffin hot marmalade at once.

RASPBERRY AND PINEAPPLE SUPREME (Serves 4 to 6)

One package raspberry-flavored gelatin, 1 pint hot water, 1 cup raspberries, 3 or 4 slices of pineapple, cut in halves. Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Arrange pineapple halves around mold. Garnish with raspberries and whipped cream, if desired.
