

FROM MIDFIELD by Bob Leonard

EVANSTON, Ill., Friday — Dear Boss: Inevitable homecoming festivities, both parental and fraternal, have handcuffed me since dropping in Monday. Thus it's Friday already.

Chicago is still the big town and busier, noisier and dirtier than ever. But also more beautiful.

Follage along the multi-million dollar Outer drives — along Lake Michigan both north and south — has reached a mid-summer sub-tropical stage, a contrast to the almost Nevada-like wastes of four years ago.

Construction is booming forward on the at-long-last subway under State street, a race, I presume, against the entire mid-town section falling into the 50-foot-deep trench. Since work was begun two years ago the street level has dropped as much as three feet in places and damage suits are pending.

Huge signs from Van Buren street on the loop's south edge to Chicago avenue on the near north side proclaim the project to be the "City of Chicago Subway" — Edward J. Kelley, Mayor.

Despite excellent traffic conditions along lakefront routes out of the downtown sector, a traffic bottleneck still exists where the four and six-laned Outer drive dips into the Old Sheridan road route at 5200. North. Litigation over usurpation of Edgewater Beach hotel riparian rights is still holding up construction furtherance.

With the subway exception, little new building is being done in the loop area. Several new facades have been put on ancient office structures. Another old building back of the Board of Trade is coming down, reportedly to make way for either a parking lot or a few-storyed "taxpayer."

Far suburban construction, however, is proceeding at a remarkable pace. Subdivisions which for years have lain idle as only sidewalked meadows, have suddenly mushroomed into communities complete with shopping districts, dogs and kids.

Along the sports line the town is agog over DiMaggio, Jimmy Dykes' expulsion, and horse racing. Arlington park is in full swing and evidently successfully operating. The move to out Bub Zupke, University of Illinois coach since 1912 and leader of the incomparable Red Grange teams of the mid-20's, is drawing galleys of press space.

Uncle Mike Jacobs is bringing the Nova-Louis thing into here in September. Chicago's first heavyweight title fight since Braddock fell before the Bomber in 1937 at White Sox park.

As far as I've been able to determine thus far, midwestern sentiment is largely anti-administration and strongly isolationist as a result.

I'll have more about that to-morrow.

Silverton Comes From Behind to Beat Locals

Pelican Lead Blasted for 7-5 Victory

Outfielder Dick Whitman, University of Oregon baseball star, poked out a three-run homer in the seventh frame of an Oregon State league baseball game Sunday afternoon at Recreation field to give the visiting Silverton Red Sox a 7-5 victory over the Klamath Pelicans.

It was fortunate, too, that the fleet center fielder came through with his circuit smash at this time, for a defeat for the Silverton nine in their first start after annexing the 1941 Oregon semi-pro title the night before wouldn't have set very well. The Red Sox decisively trimmed the Bend Elks Saturday night at Silverton, 12-2, for the championship and a trip to Kansas City for the national tournament.

The Pelicans got away to a 5-0 lead in the first three innings by pounding out four hits, including homers by First Baseman Paul Crapo and Right Fielder Warren Wahner, off Pitcher Jack Richards. Cal McIrwin, the big youngster with the hopping fast ball and a tricky curve, relieved Richards after Wahner's blow sailed over the left field fence. From then on the locals were unable to score, collecting only two hits during the remainder of the tilt.

Crapo homered over the right field fence in the second frame with no one on to give the Klamath club a 1-0 lead. Paul Bernadou opened the third with a sizzling single to left, Pitcher Orin Davis beat out an infield tap and Jack Lloyd sacrificed with a neat bunt down the third base line. Manager Ernie Bishop was safe at first and Bernadou scored when Shortstop Al Kretchmar threw wildly over Catcher Jim Robertson's head at the plate. Davis tallied also when Lee Shinn, Red Sox third baseman, muffed Robertson's throw to nip Davis. Wahner followed with his four-pyawl scoring: Bishop ahead of him.

The Silverton outfit pushed across single markers in the fourth and sixth and two runs in the fifth on seven hits, two of which were doubles by Kretchmar and Carney.

In the seventh Robertson was safe at first on Lloyd's bobble. Kretchmar singled and Whitman stepped to the plate to send a pitch over the left field wall and finish Pitcher Davis' tenure on the mound for the Pelicans. Steve Janaso, newcomer to the Klamath squad, allowed no runs and two hits in hurling the last two and two-thirds innings for the losers.

Klamath Falls was helped out of some tough spots by three double plays during the contest. Second Baseman Bishop, pivot man on two of the relays and starter of the third twin killing, pulled some fast fielding to engineer the plays and cut off several potential runs for the invaders.

Whitman, Carney, Kretchmar and McIrwin contributed two hits apiece to the 11-hit assault on the two Pelican twirlers. Wahner, with a single and homer, paced the Klamath batters.

Next Sunday the Pelicans take on the Albany Aicos at Albany in a league game with a Saturday night exhibition game also on the slate. Tuesday night at the local park the locals will tackle the Kansas City Monarchs, world's champion colored diamond aces, starting at 8 p. m.

SILVERTON, July 14 (AP) — The Silverton Red Sox earned a trip to Wichita, Kan., Saturday night by walloping Bend 12 to 2, and winning the Oregon semi-pro baseball championship. Earl Toolson held Bend to six hits and was named the tournament's most valuable pitcher. Five of his teammates also were named on the all-star team. They will play in the national semi-pro congress.

Ghezzi Tips Nelson Off PGA Peak

Match Decided When Former Champ Misses Putt on 38th Green

DENVER, July 14 (AP) — It was only a 30-inch putt and it wobbled into the cup like any duffer's effort, but to 6-foot-3 inch Vic Ghezzi it was worth \$500 and his first professional golfers association title.

The handsome Deal, N. J., veteran won the championship and the \$1,100 top prize after nine years' trying in a 36-hole epic with Defending Champion Byron Nelson of Toledo, Ohio, against the mountain backdrop at Cherry Hills yesterday.

And the missed shot that cost the Texas-bred Nelson the last chance at his second straight crown and the difference between first money and the \$600 he won was a putt of the same 24-foot length.

Picture the scene of the second extra hole of the up-and-down struggle, with a tense gallery massed around the green by the lake in the hot late-afternoon sun.

Both players, worn from physical and nervous strain, failed to reach the carpet of the 400-yard hole with their seconds.

Unable to determine which was the farther from the cup, they huddled like football captains to flip a coin and Nelson won. He putted first and went by at the right. Then Ghezzi, with \$500 and the long-sought title riding on his grass-stained blade, went in by the right side.

Ghezzi never before had won a championship of this importance. He showed the fighting heart of a true champion in coming from behind, Nelson was three up at the 27-hole station and it looked as though nothing would stop him.

It was Byron's third blood-tingling championship scrap in three years in this greatest of match play fixtures for the professionals. He was beaten by Henry Picard in 37 holes two years ago and collared Sam Snead at 36 last year.

At Cherry Hills Ghezzi equalled par for the 38 holes. Nelson was one over par.

Ghezzi, who never before had cleared the third round of the P.G.A., said he beat "one of the finest golf players we've ever had. I feel like a kid on Christmas morning."

Portlander Nabs 3 Tennis Crowns

PORTLAND, July 14 (AP) — Oregon's sun was no hotter than Lanky Emery Neale yesterday as the Portland youth blasted his way to three championships in the state tennis tournament.

He first trimmed short, stocky Ronald English, Oakland, Calif., 5-7, 6-2, 6-2, 7-5, for the men's singles title.

Then in weather so hot the players stopped after each game to wash off the perspiration and dust from the clay courts, he teamed with Leonard Clark, Portland, University of Oregon star, to win the men's doubles crown from English and Larry Hall, Bakersfield, Calif., 3-6, 6-4, 3-6, 6-3, 7-5.

Apparently not slowed down by those nine grueling sets, he next joined Dorothy Head, Alameda, Calif., and won the mixed doubles championship from Hall and Mrs. Kay Mayers Warren, San Francisco, 2-6, 6-3, 6-2.
