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LUMLBERING AT LAKEVIEW ON BUSY SCHEDULE

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—(Special) Lake county lumber companies are booming. With defense orders for ammunition cases filling their order schedules and building in Lakeview reaching its top mark, most of Lake county's mills and box factories are running at full capacity and lumbermen throughout the county are looking forward to one of their biggest and busiest late seasons.

Anderson Brothers Lumber Company is shipping about 150,000 feet out of Lakeview each day, with operations proceeding at good speed in the woods. Running two shifts, Andersons have eight trucks and three diesels operating in the timber with about 85 men employed in both operations.

Underwood Lumber Company's moulding plant is running two machines in two shifts, with the box factory running one shift. The moulding plant expects to ship 10 to 12 cars a month with the addition of another moulder.

Approximately 100,000 feet a week will be the drying capacity of a new dry kiln which the Lakeview Lumber company plans to construct immediately. Additions to the company office also show that the company is booming.

Oregon Moulding company, running two shifts, have installed a cut-stock department in their planing mill. This addition will permit the company to fill orders for cut length Venetian blind stock.

Running at full production is the lumber report of the Goose Lake Box company, the result of cutting government orders, according to L. D. Olson, manager.

DeArmond Brothers Lumber company is working two shifts at full capacity. Cutting around 120,000 feet, Buzard Burkhardt company, is going great guns. Yes, Lakeview is booming in the lumber industry.—Lake County Examiner.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING DUE FOR EXPANSION

Discussion of expanded participation by Klamath Union high school in the state's vocational education program was a feature of Monday night's meeting of the board of the high school district.

Superintendent Arnold Grapp outlined what is being done in the state in vocational education and was authorized by the board to make a trip to Salem to confer with state officials on material expansion of the program here.

This was the first meeting of the school board in the new fiscal year, with Freeman Schultz taking over duties as director from the Algoma zone. Percy Murray was re-elected chairman for the new year.

Chairman A. M. Collier of the city recreation committee and Architect Howard Perrin attended the school board meeting to discuss the proposed swimming pool program in the Modoc field area.
