FISHER TRIAL SET JULY 30 IN COURT HERE

Trial of Floyd Fisher was set Tuesday by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg for July 30.

Fisher is accused of assault with intent to kill, in connection with the shooting of Indian Officer Thurmon Wilson at Beatty a week and a half ago. The defendant, a 47-year-old white man married to an Indian woman, entered a plea of not guilty and is represented by F. O. Small, who was appointed by the court.

Fisher was arrested in a grain field near Beatty after a chase by a posse headed by Sheriff Lloyd L. Low.

Wilson, 35-year-old federal officer, was shot twice through the chest when he went to the Fisher house in response to a call by Mrs. Fisher.

He is at Klamath Valley hospital, where he has made progress toward recovery despite the parallel holes through his chest and a collapsed lung.

The charge on which Fisher is to be tried carries a possible life sentence if a conviction is obtained.

He appealed to every postal employee to press sales of defense stamps and bonds and outlined a new program for sales.

A capacity crowd heard the postmaster general speak. Walker was accompanied by Mrs. Walker, Harold Ambrose, his administrative assistant, Portland Postmaster Dr. E. T. Hedlund, and C. H. Goodhue, Northern Pacific official.

This afternoon Walker was driven to The Dalles en route east.

FORT LEWIS, July 16 (AP)—

Addressing the third division on the 23rd anniversary of battle of the Marne, Maj. Gen. Charles F. Thompson told the soldiers yesterday that they may be confronted with just as severe a test as their predecessors and asserted that their spirit seemed to guarantee they would "fulfill the best of divisional traditions in any crisis." The third division, now known as the "Rock of the Marne," threw back two divisions of German shock troops during that historic battle of the first World war.
