

CLAIMS FAIL TO SHOW RED ARMY STATUS

Conflicting claims continued to mark the German and Russian war reports, but there appeared to be nothing in the news to controvert the red statement that, while the fierce battles for Leningrad and Moscow went on unabated, there was no significant change in the position of the troops overnight.

There seemed no doubt that the conflict was raging within the actual confines of the great Stalin line itself at many points. Since the nazis remained on the offensive in this wilderness of death, the vital question is how much they have undermined the bolshevist powers of resistance and laid the groundwork for the disintegration which Berlin for days has been asserting was under way.

That is to say, while the reds thus far have interposed a stalwart defense, there is no measure by which we can judge how far, if at all, their stamina may have been impaired. We know the German army from past performances, but the bolshevist fighting machine is an unknown quantity.

However, while it is true that we may be on the verge of great things, the nazis haven't up to this point substantiated the colorful claim of their press that "the German armies have overcome two things — mass and space — which the English and Russians have seen as a hindrance" to a victory in the east by the reich.

There certainly is considerable justification for this nazis assertion. Hitler's legions have covered an amazing amount of ground against the fierce opposition of a great mass of men and machines. The boast would seem to expose a weakness, however, by taking in too much territory. The invaders still have a lot of "mass and space" to overcome before they can call it a job well done.

When you talk of Russia in terms of "space" you're speaking of the world's largest country in area, covering one-sixth of the earth. The farther the Germans drive into this vast territory the greater will become their difficulties — so long as they encounter resistance — because of the extension of their communications over which must come supplies and reinforcements.

It's a thousand miles from Berlin to Moscow by rail, and something more by highway. Of course, not all supplies come from Berlin, but that figure gives you an idea of the distances involved. It doesn't tell you, though, that good highways are few and far between, that the Russian railways use the wide gauge and that therefore trains from the rest of Europe cannot run on them.

Social Security Checks Paid To 104 in Klamath County

A total of 104 men, women and children in Klamath county were receiving a check each month from the federal treasury under the old-age and survivors' insurance program of the social security act at the end of last March, Wesley Hayes, Klamath Falls manager of the social security board, announced today.

Payments in the county at that time amounted to \$1848 a month, Hayes said, but have been substantially increased by the approval of new claims in the past three months.

Of the 104 persons receiving monthly payments, 47 were retired workers of age 65 or more and 8 were wives of retired workers who are also 65. Payments to the retired workers and their wives amount to \$1148 a month. The retired worker's wife, if 65, receives a check of half the amount paid her husband; if less than 65, she receives it when reaching that age.

Several young children are also on the Klamath county list, Hayes said, as a result of the

survivors' insurance feature of the federal act which provides a monthly income to the widow and young children of an insured worker who dies, regardless of the age at which death occurred. These benefits, he pointed out, are illustrated by payments to 10 widows in the county who had young children in their care and also to 37 children under age 18. Total payments to these widows and children amounted to \$665 a month in March.

Other recipients in the county included widows who are 65 or more years of age, those being survivors of insured workers who have died.

"Payments under the old-age and survivors' insurance plan are based entirely on the worker's employment and earnings at jobs covered by the social security act," Hayes said. "When employed at such jobs, the worker pays 1 per cent of his salary or wages as a federal tax and the employer pays an equal amount."

"The two principal types of monthly payments include: (1) a monthly check to the worker on retirement at age 65 or any later age, with a supplemental check to his wife if she is 65, and (2) monthly checks to the widow and children of a worker who dies, regardless of the worker's age at death, these payments often amounting to a total of \$5000 to \$10,000 over a period of years."

Lump sum settlements are also made when an insured worker dies leaving no family dependent entitled to a monthly check when death occurred. These settlements, it was said, add substantially to the monthly payments shown above.

Hayes said a considerable number of workers in the county who are 65 and older have had sufficient employment and earnings under the law to entitle them to monthly payments when they choose to retire. The
