Londos Downs Chick In Armory Rematch

Spin Artist Uses Slams For Victory

Once again the fangs of defeat were felt by Dude Chick as heavyweight Jim Londos scored a two-fall victory in the main tangle of last night's armory wrestling card.

Before the main mat bout between the two champs, Jack Frayne, the ringside announcer, told the crowd that due to a bit of fixing up on the armory floor the lights will be darkened in the armory for the next two weeks and no matches will be held, but starting again on August 6 a full sized all-star wrestling card will be held.

There was no slump in activities throughout the match and each man kept the other going. The first of the round featured a wide variety of arm holds, the first applied by Londos as he growled with every effort, then Dude came up with a self strangle which almost had the Greek Adonis giving up, but a little bit of maneuvering fixed that up.

Then came the first fall with Chick on the bottom of his own leg split. Londos pressed hard and Referee Earl Yokley tapped his mitt on the canvas for the 1-2-3 count.

The cowboy's headlocks didn't click because Big Jeem would simply jerk his neck a bit and send Chick flying across the mat apron.

Londos didn't try any airplane spins, but Dude tried two. On both occasions the struggling body of the Greek would maneuver itself to or into the ropes and there Chick would be with a no solo flight.

Jim came out of a punishing scissors and threw the cowboy to the mat with two backward body slams, then he threw his 208 pounds on the stunned Chick and held him down for the fall, making it two straight for the international heavy-weight king.

"I've been robbed," or words to that effect were voiced when the arbitrator handed the deciding fall of the middle event to George Wagner on a foul. His most able opponent who didn't think it right was the Weed Wildman Pete Belcastro.

This middle event had every one either on the edge of their seats or standing up as these two galloping gladiators tore in to each other for all the holds and slugs in the game book. Pete was the one who started the rough stuff and George gave him back everything he dished out.

Wagner took the first fall with a rib breaker and a body press. Pizen Pete took the second with an arm breaker after the help of a noble passerby peanut shell which was used for a bit of that old pastime, gouging.

Wagner spent most of the last period outside the ropes, although not to his liking. Pete had kicked him out and every time the Texan wished to get back in the spotlight Belcastro would oust him again. After so much of this the referee awarded the fall to Wagner on foul after foul.

In a purely scientific opener Ernie Piluso, the Klamath Aladdin, took two out of three falls from the Chinese boy, Walter Achlu.

"Sneeze" took the first fall with a short arm scissors which he held for a long time, and Ernie gave up after a few vain attempts to free himself.

The second and third falls went to Piluso with the same hold, that of the short leg scissors which saw Achlu give up on both occasions.

Traveling Team Gets 16 Hits Off Pelicans; Big Crowd Watches Contest

Lacing out 16 hits off two Klamath hurlers, the Kansas City Monarchs, colored world's champions, scored a 12-6 win over the Pelicans last night at Recreation park before an audience of under 500 persons.

The Monarchs were paced in the hitting department by Leon Young, big outfielder who cracked out two homers, Jack Marshall, shortstop, who garnered four hits including two doubles, and Southpaw First Baseman Archie Ware, who accounted for the other homer of the evening. Ware and Young batted in seven of the winners' tallies with the little first sacker punching across four of them.

Three runs crossed the plate for the Kansas City nine in the first inning on four hits, an outfield error and a sacrifice. Center Fielder Fred McDaniels and Marshall led off the game with doubles with Herb Cyrus' sacrifice sandwiched in between. Ware followed with a circuit smash over the right field fence.

In the second frame the Monarchs counted two more markers on hits by McDaniels and Marshall and the Klamath first baseman's error. Pitcher Clyde Carlstrom replaced Steve Janaso at the start of the third, but the Pelicans misused three times to allow the visitors to post two more tallies on one hit for a 7-0 lead.

Center Fielder Jack Mahoney walked with one away in the last of the third, advanced to second on a passed ball and scored on Shortstop Jack Lloyd's single to right to give the locals their first run of the ball game.

INDIAN CANYON COURSE, SPOKANE, Wash., July 16 (UP) Jimmy Clark, long-driving Long Beach, Calif., aircraft worker, coasted in tonight with an amazing 64-71—135 medal score to take qualifying honors in the 20th annual public links golf championships.

His brilliant playing, however, wasn't good enough to capture the team championship for Long Beach, but was good enough for a second.

Detroit, with 435 point total, took team honors and the cup donated by former President Warren G. Harding, now held by San Francisco.

Alameda, Calif., was third with 446 points, followed by Los Angeles, Baltimore and Honolulu, each with 451.

After them came Atlanta, 453; Spokane and Sacramento, 454; St. Paul, 455; Pittsburgh, 456; Oakland and Dayton, O., 458; Portland, Ore., 459; Cleveland, 460; Denver, 462; Seattle, 464; San Francisco, 465; Louisville, 470; Tacoma, Wash., 474; Chicago, 478; Indianapolis, 486, and Milwaukee, 503.

Although Jimmy Clark was the popular hero of the day, Bob McReynolds of Portland, Ore., scored the best second round with a card of 36-32—68, which, added to his 75 of yesterday, gave him a 143.

It took 151 to qualify for match play tomorrow and 17 players in the 151 class were battling for 13 places in a playoff.

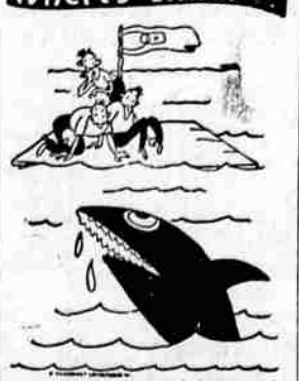
Your Questions on Organized Labor Answered.
