Mrs. Ethel Crumrine and family enjoyed a visit with her aunt from Portland over the weekend.

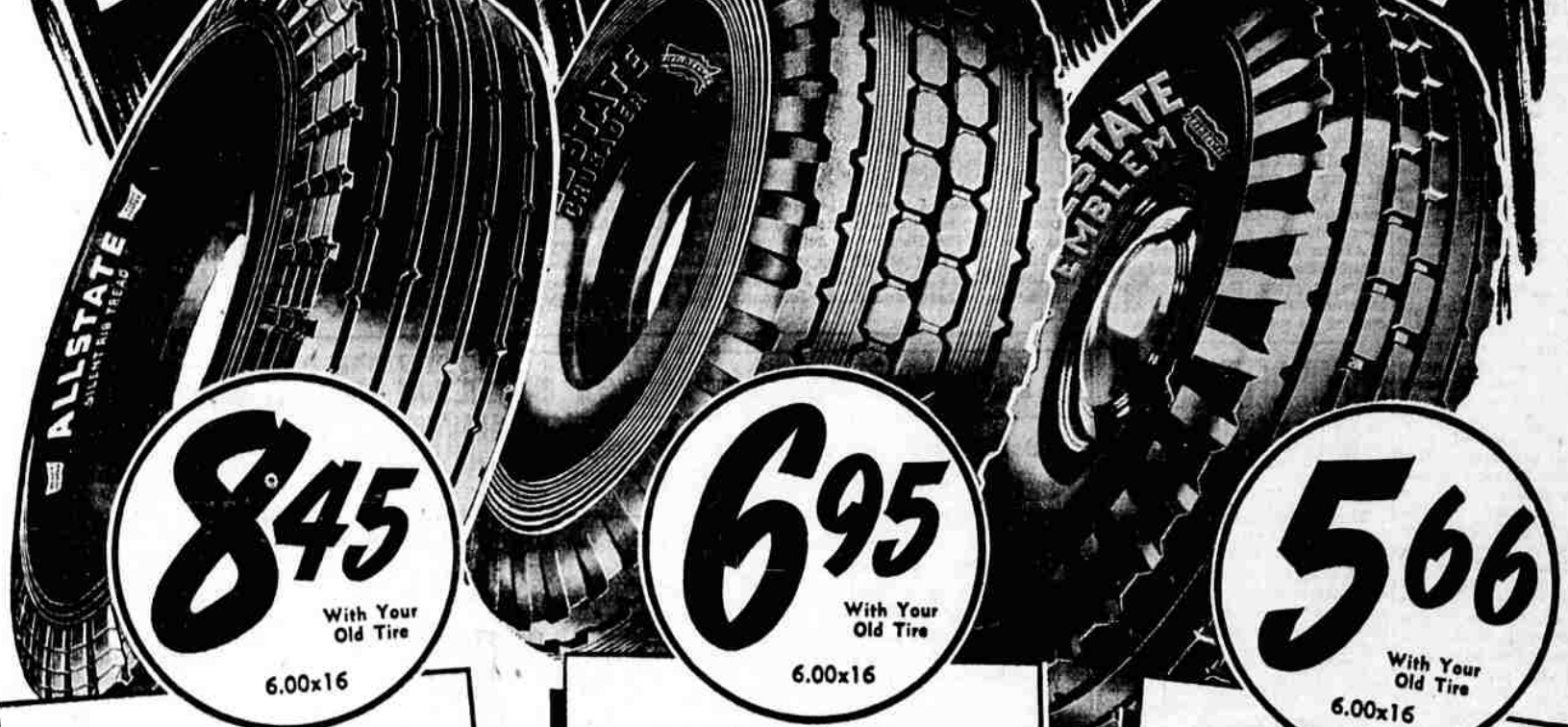
