

NAVY OFFICER SAYS AMERICA PATROLS SEAS

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—Rear Admiral John H. Towers, chief of the navy's bureau of aeronautics, told the house naval committee today that United States navy planes "are doing patrol work all over the world."

Rep. Cole (R-N.Y.) asked Towers whether the navy was doing patrol work in the Pacific.

The airman's reply was that the navy was patrolling by plane in "the Atlantic and Pacific, the Philippine area and the Panama area."

Towers also told the committee that "all our patrol planes are not just in practice work. I'm sure this committee knows it was one of the patrol planes, an American-built patrol plane, which located and trailed the Bismarck."

Later he said he meant that it was "an American plane built to British order," and not an American flag plane, which located the German battleship in its vain attempt to elude British pursuers.

The patrol discussion arose when Towers said it was planned to provide facilities at Tongue Point, Oregon, for two squadrons of patrol bombers though original plans called for only one-half squadron or six planes, there.

"What change of conditions in the last year or two has caused an increase of 400 per cent in the number of planes for Tongue Point?"

Towers explained that originally Tongue Point was to handle six planes under a 3000-plane program but that now the navy had a 15,000-plane program.

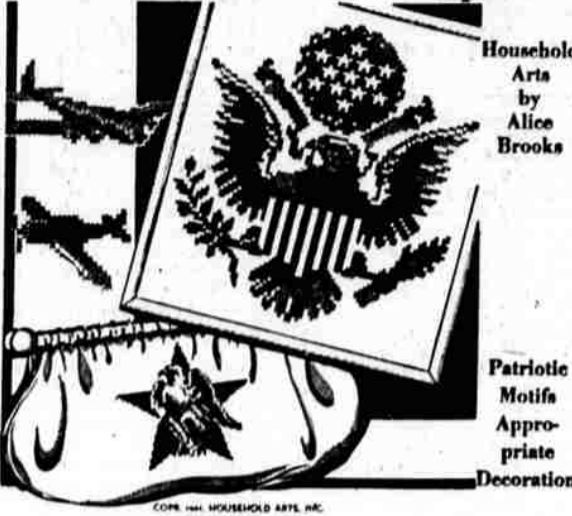
"There will be further expansion you will hear of later," Towers added. He was testifying on a bill to provide \$300,000,000 for additional naval shore facilities.

CCC'S TRAINED TO NATION'S DEFENSE

James J. McEnter, director of the civilian conservation corps, today announced that a recent survey disclosed that on June 1, approximately 8522 young men and war veterans enrolled in Oregon CCC camps were receiving training related directly or indirectly to national defense.

He stated that all junior enrollees receive job training and basic CCC training which is of the greatest value to them whether they are called to duty under the selective service law or obtain jobs in national defense industries. The job training includes truck driving, tractor operation, surveying, drafting, etc.

Of the 8522 men enrolled in the 56 Oregon camps in May, 538 were taking special national defense vocational training courses in camp or in nearby trade schools in cooperation with state vocational training authorities. Another 65 men were taking full-time vocational courses at the CCC radio school, cooks and bakers school and the central motor repair shop located in the state.

EUGENE, KLAMATH CHAMBERS MEET

Navy Promises Ad To Acquaint Men With Opportunities

The navy is planning to use newspaper advertising, both metropolitan and smaller dailies, to inform young men of opportunities in navy enlistment, it was revealed today by officials of the thirteenth naval district.

Rear Admiral C. S. Freeman, commandant of the thirteenth naval district, has asked the bureau of navigation to consider Pacific northwest newspapers in making up the advertising budget, they said.

"The navy is keenly aware of the power of the advertising columns of the newspaper," a district spokesman said. "In these troublesome times, the navy offers some genuine opportunities to college graduates as well as to those who have not attended college. These opportunities are the equal of anything now available to younger men in civilian life. It is felt that the newspaper is the medium through which to inform these men of their opportunities in the navy."

Henderson Views Need for Laws To Control Rent

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—Leon Henderson, price administrator, said today that rent control laws would be necessary in defense areas where voluntary methods fail to prevent increases.

In many places where the housing shortage is acute, rents are "skyrocketing," Henderson told a house committee investigating labor migration.

"In some shipbuilding, ordnance and army cantonment centers as many as one out of every two rented homes have had rent increases ranging from 20 to 100 per cent since October 1939," he testified.

"In Bremerton, Wash.—the site of the Puget sound navy yard—there has been an average increase of 16 per cent on about 50 out of every 100 rented homes.
