CALIFORNIA CURBS LEMONADE, CLAIM

SEATTLE, July 18 (AP)—Nine Seattle produce men today telegraphed to the US agriculture department, blaming the citrus fruit pro-rate in California for the current heat wave lemon shortage which has sent prices from \$5 and \$6 to \$8 and \$10 per crate.

Henry Blesener, district manager for the Mutual Orange Distributors, a grower-controlled California cooperative, charged that a California lemon monopoly had used the department's pro-rate to restrict lemon shipments by diverting 30 to 40 carloads a day from the fresh fruit trade.

Hardware and electrical appliance dealers said the demand had been so great this week that not a single electric fan, suitable for home or office use, was available at any price, and that some stores, to keep good will, had sold the fans out of their own offices.

Others sold electric heaters to keep their customers cool. This paradox is possible by disconnecting the heating element and using the small fans in the back of the heater to circulate the air.
