POURING JOB STARTED ON DRAIN TUNNEL

TULELAKE—Concrete pouring crews at the reclamation drainage tunnel poured concrete all night Wednesday in the tunnel proper, it was announced by the office force of J. A. Terling and company, contractors. No estimate was given of the number of feet of forms covered but the work marks the beginning of actual concrete operations with the 6600 foot bore. Concrete pouring at the west portal that empties into the drainage canal began several days ago.

The big wood and steel forms built in 31 units that add to a total of approximately 600 feet went into the tunnel several weeks ago. Concrete will be poured or blown around the forms to form the horseshoe shaped interior of the 5-foot, nine-inch hole through the hill.

BLY PLANS STRICT FIRE PREVENTION

BLY—The fire department, recently reorganized and planning for a strenuous fire prevention program in Bly, has served emphatic notice to residents of this community that weeds and waste heaps and rubbish piles must be annihilated at once if fire prevention is to be effective. Fires started in trash and dry grass burned several homes last summer and might well have obliterated the town, much as a similar fire wiped out Dorris in the memory of local persons.

A systematic cleanup by individual residents will be necessary. The bulkier rubbish and trash should be hauled to the dump, the department says. Grass and weeds after cutting should be piled on bare ground and burned in the early morning hours. It is a good idea to have water handy, and to stay with your fire until it is out and then wet down the ashes. Wholehearted cooperation on the part of everyone immediately will greatly lessen the fire hazard and insure greater safety for life and property in the community.

Get the Most From Your Quota Of Citrus Fruit, Aid Health

In every American family, the national defense drive can be applied to home menus. The modern science of nutrition, if translated into familiar terms, will increase the health of stamping of every member of your family. More milk and more citrus fruit every day is one of the major recommendations of our leading nutritionists.

Dry skim milk is cheaper than fluid milk. It can be substituted on occasion for the fluid and used in sauces, puddings and muffins for those members of the family who don't like to drink milk. Seven-eighths of a cup of dry skim milk made into a liquid with 31 cups of water equals about a quart of fresh skim milk in nutritive value.

Get Nutrients
For economy, use the less fancy grade of grapefruit. They may not look as nice, but they have high nutritive value.

Here's a note on grading from the Consumers' Guide, a publication of the U.S. department of agriculture:

"The use of grades for canned grapefruit juice and canned grapefruit is voluntary. No canner is required to use these standards."

"Only two grades are defined for canned grapefruit juice: Grade A and grade C. In general grade A canned grapefruit juice is the best quality you can buy. The grade specification requires a natural light color, a juice that is practically free from defects, that contains only a small amount of pulp, and may be sweetened or unsweetened."

"Grade C grapefruit juice may be darker in color, may contain more pulp, may contain slightly more oil than grade A, and may not be so delicately flavored. Grade C grapefruit juice, like all grade C canned goods, is wholesome, nourishing, and well flavored, and may be sweetened or unsweetened."

Grades Not Required
"There are three grades for canned grapefruit, A, B, and 'Broken.' Grade A canned grapefruit is carefully selected for size, color, texture and flavor. Grade B is a choice product, which may lack the uniform excellence of grade A. Broken grade canned grapefruit may be of very good quality but is packed from broken grapefruit segments."

"Consumers should remember that canned grapefruit and grapefruit juice are not legally required to be graded. Therefore, if consumers want these very useful grade statements on the canned citrus they buy, they must ask for them at their grocery stores."

WHITE SATIN CAKE

1 1/2 c. shortening
1 1/2 c. "White Satin" sugar
2 c. cake flour
2 c. baking powder
1/2 c. salt
1/2 c. milk
4 egg whites
1/2 c. lemon juice
1/2 c. salt

Beat shortening and sugar until fluffy. Add flour alternately with milk in small amounts. Beat well after each addition. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold in and add lemon juice. Bake in two greased 9-inch layer pans in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 25-30 min. When cold put together and ice with SEVEN MINUTE ICING.

1 c. "White Satin" sugar
1/2 c. milk
1/2 c. vanilla
1/2 c. baking powder
1/2 c. salt

Put sugar, water, baking powder and egg whites in top beater in lifted out that constantly until fluffy or when egg is lifted out of the icing stands in points. Remove immediately from boiling water. Add vanilla and salt.
