

RIVER VICTIMS KIN OF JUDGE REEDER OF K. F.

County Judge and Mrs. U. E. Reeder went to Lakeview Saturday to assist in making funeral arrangements for Judge Reeder's niece, Mrs. Woodrow Morris, who drowned with her husband in the John Day river Thursday night.

Judge Reeder said the funeral has been set for 2:30 p. m. Monday in Lakeview.

The county official received details of the tragedy, which left two small children as orphans.

He said the Morris have been living at Monument, in Grant county, where Mr. Morris was educational advisor at a CCC camp.

On Thursday evening after an extremely hot day, Mr. and Mrs. Morris found difficulty in sleeping and accepted the suggestion when a neighbor woman came along with a proposal they bathe in the John Day river, a few feet from their home.

Mr. Morris stepped in a deep hole. He was unable to swim. Mrs. Morris, an excellent swimmer, went to the aid of her husband. It was dark and their companion said she heard a struggle in the water but did not see what happened.

She gave an alarm and immediately boys from the CCC camp began a search of the river. It was 2 a. m. before both bodies were recovered.

Their small children slept peacefully in the nearby house. The bodies and the two children were expected at Lakeview Saturday evening.

Mr. Morris was 24 years old and Mrs. Morris was 22. Both had attended Oregon State college and were long-time residents of Lakeview.

'V' CAMPAIGN ASKS EUROPE TO BEAT NAZIS

LONDON, July 19 (AP)—Col. V. Britton, Britain's mysterious radio "Voice of Doom," called on the peoples of German-occupied countries Friday to begin mobilizing a "V for victory" army within 48 hours to strike at the Germans in any possible way.

His broadcast climaxed a week of promotion by the British Broadcasting corporation of a "V for victory" propaganda campaign which the Germans promptly claimed they had originated for their own purposes.

Britton, in a speech aimed at the occupied countries, told the people that the time had come for them to strike back at their Nazi enslavers.

"Tomorrow the V army—Europe's invisible army of many millions—will come into being," he said. "It is the date of Europe's mobilization against the Germans."

He said the mobilization should be carried out with strictest discipline, continuing: "It will begin at midnight 24 hours from now and continue all day, July 20 will become one of the milestones of the war."

Britton urged all his European listeners to join the army, pointing out that they could do two things:

"Take a vow at the earliest moment Sunday to continue faithfully this fight the best way you can for your country's independence and honor and that of the other nations enslaved by the Nazi Germans."

"You are asked to take every opportunity this Sunday to demonstrate to the Germans the mobilization of the V army by putting V's on walls and everywhere you can put them and by beating out the V sound—three dots and a dash—wherever you get a chance.

"Let the V splash from one end of Europe to the other.

"The time has come for you to act. You are asked to join a disciplined army, a strange army but one to which it is an honor to belong. It is an army which the Germans fear.

"You have probably noticed that the Germans are so alarmed by your V's that they are trying to cause confusion by using the V themselves.

"This need not worry you. Leave the confusion where it belongs—in Berlin. You know this tapping means 'fate knocking on the door.' The Germans will not drown out the knocking of fate, however loud they beat, and when they rap out V they merely are signaling their own impending doom.

"We shall hurry it as much as we can."

ROME, July 19 (AP)—British troops moving out of the besieged Libyan port of Tobruk attacked two Italian positions, but were repelled, the Italian high command said today.

AAA WHEAT APPEAL COMMITTEE NAMED

CORVALLIS, July 19 (AP)—The state AAA office today set up four regional committees to hear appeals of growers on wheat marketing quota allotments and yields.

Any grower may file an appeal with his county committee which in turn will transmit it to the district appeal board. The hearing will then be held in the home county of the grower making the appeal.

Market quotas, voted last May, apply to all growers of more than 15 acres of wheat. Those producing less than that amount and those complying with AAA acreage allotments, are automatically given marketing card.

Committees included: Crook, Deschutes, Grant, Harney, Jefferson, Klamath and Lake counties—Edwin M. Wright, Redmond, chairman; Røy Perry, Lakeview, vice chairman; Guy J. Corwin, Madras. Alternates are Burrell Short, Klamath Falls; Clarence Adams, Prineville, and Roger Kent, Canyon City.

(Continued from Page One) staff to Kazan, in the Tartar republic, 450 miles to the east.

The Russian command said that the full fury of the blitz offensive was concentrated in the Smolensk and related sectors. "Stubborn fighting" continued there during the night, the communique said, adding:

"On other parts of the front nothing of significance occurred."

The red air force, also active through the night against motorized and mechanized troops and German airdromes, was reported to have destroyed 32 German planes yesterday or a total of 71 in the past three days.

While the red army minimized the German offensive in sectors away from the center of the long front, the German high command claimed for its troops and Rumanian comrades a crossing of the Dniester (Dneestr) river in several places in an advance from Russian Bessarabia into the Ukraine. There had been previous German reports to this effect.

to invade England before winter."

REPORTS from continental agents (spies), this source says, indicate that Germany has moved the cream of her troops to the eastern front. The mere problem of reassembling them into invasion armies in the west would take a minimum of six weeks under the most favorable conditions.

But, he continues, favorable conditions do not exist because of:

1. Heavy losses of men and material inflicted by the Russians.

2. Damage to communications and bases in Western Germany and along the invasion coasts inflicted by the RAF.

It was Napoleon's towering ambition that led him to invade Russia. The invasion weakened him and led him to his fall.

The chance is present that history may repeat itself in Hitler's case.

Americans "in the interest of national defense.

Officials said every effort is being made by detailed investigations here and abroad to determine the desirability of applicants as prospective American citizens and to keep foreign agents from slipping into the country in the guise of immigrants.

Under President Roosevelt's orders, visa applications also are carefully examined, to prevent the entry of persons who leave close relatives in Germany, Italy or Nazi-conquered countries.

An official state department announcement said the regulation was necessary because a considerable number of cases had been discovered where such applicants had promised to act as German agents here, with their close relatives held as hostages to insure delivery of information desired concerning American defense activities.
