**Dr. Earhart Named NYA Doctor Here**

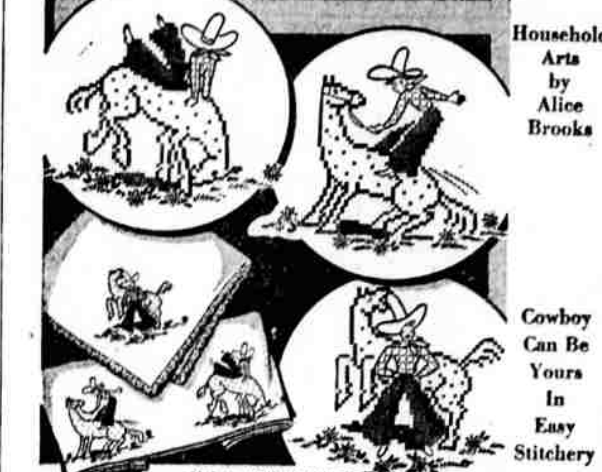
