CHILOQUIN STRIKE PARLEYS CONTINUE

Negotiations were continued Monday night between a CIO committee and representatives of the Chiloquin Lumber company in an effort to end the week-long strike of over 200 Chiloquin mill, yard, woods and box factory employes.

Parleys are proceeding amicably, a company spokesman said Tuesday.

Men of the mill, yards and factory voted to strike Monday night, July 14, after logging crews had walked out. The entire operation has been shut down since then.

The CIO International Woodworkers of America several months ago won a national labor relations board election but no collective bargaining agreement has as yet been signed.

It was understood the men are striking for higher pay.

BOY NEAR RECORD AS HOTCAKE EATER

Twenty-one hotcakes were consumed by one of the boys attending the Lake o' the Woods camp conducted by the city and county recreation and juvenile offices last week, according to City Recreation Officer Dave Bridge.

Bridge said the boys at camp proved tremendous eaters. Many of them would gobble more than a dozen pancakes, although only one managed to take in 21 at one sitting.

Bridge reported to the city council Monday night on the success of the camp, and councilmen warmly commended the enterprise. Junior policemen and other boys from town attended the outing.

House Committee Rejects Revision Of Profits Tax

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—The house ways and means committee today rejected President Roosevelt's reported request for revision of the committee's proposed excess profits tax plan and formally agreed to recommend that corporations be permitted to compute their excess profits by either the invested capital or average earnings methods.

The chief executive was said authoritatively to have requested that the average earnings methods be eliminated.

Representative Cooper (D-Tenn.), as spokesman for the group, said the committee also ratified its previously tentative decision in favor of drastically increased individual income surtaxes, starting at 5 per cent on the first dollar of taxable income. It also adopted formally the proposed corporation surtax rates ranging from 5 per cent on incomes up to \$25,000 to 6 per cent on any excess.

MOVIE WORK ENDS AT CRATER LAKE

Filming over, 12 movie men of the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studio entrained Tuesday morning via the Southern Pacific from Chiloquin for Hollywood.

The group has been at work at Crater lake for the past week shooting background scenes for the forthcoming picture "Sundown" starring Bruce Cabot. It was understood the story action is centered in India but where Crater lake will fit in with a Hindu setting was not disclosed. The picture is scheduled for an October release date.

Approximately 30 Klamath Indians were hired during the week's filming.

According to a Southern Pacific spokesman, the greater part of the week was spent in scaling the precipitous cliffs on the lake side of Watchman mountain. An amphibian plane was used in the shooting.

RAF Roars Across Channel to Raid Calais, Boulogne

LONDON, July 22 (AP)—Strong RAF units roared across the channel this afternoon in continuation of widespread raids of last night and this morning on German-held territory.

Objectives in western Germany, Denmark, the Netherlands, Belgium and northern France were attacked overnight, the British said.

This afternoon's raid seemed concentrated on the coast between Calais and Boulogne, where anti-aircraft guns blazed into action from the French cliffs, dimly outlined through the haze. The rumble of explosions rattled doors and windows on the English coast, where watchers could see the bursting of anti-aircraft shells.

From the earlier raids only one British bomber failed to return, the air ministry said.

FISHER GIVEN 20-YEAR TERM FOR ASSAULT

he got a rifle and sat down, waiting for the officer to come. When Wilson came in the door, he said, he shot. Wilson turned and went outside. Fisher said he later went around the house, saw Wilson by a woodpile, and shot again at the officer.

Sisemore read this and a statement of a witness of the shooting and said this was evidence of cold-blooded intention to kill.

Judge Vandenberg asked about Fisher's condition at the time of the shooting, as regards drinking or intoxication. Sisemore said a blood test showed Fisher had been "drinking." Sheriff Low related details of the night of the shooting, stating he called at least 20 or 25 times for Fisher to give himself up and finally had to shoot at him and chase him, finding Fisher lying armed in a field. He said Fisher evidently had been drinking but was "not staggering."

The judge then picked up a law book, opened it, and unhesitatingly sentenced Fisher to a term "not to exceed 20 years."

Fisher left the courtroom in charge of officers.

Navy May Double Reenlistment Bonus

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—The house naval committee voted today to give double reenlistment bonuses, ranging from \$200 to \$600, to regular enlisted men of the navy who reenlist voluntarily within 24 hours after expiration of present enlistments.

The provision was made part of a senate-approved measure providing that all men enlisting hereafter for naval service may be retained after expiration of the enlistment period for such period as the secretary of the navy may deem necessary in time of war or national emergency declared by the president.

DNB (German propaganda) admits today that the Russians are carrying out Stalin's "scorched earth" order. It says: "German troops, marching with heavy packs, tramped through the choking ash dust of BURNED forests."

THE British continue DAY air raiding of the German-held invasion coasts. German air attacks on England, London says, are light.

The implication is that Germany's air force is too busy in Russia to spare many planes for fighting in the west.

LAKE O' WOODS BUILDING BURNS

A wooden building housing a public rest room and the resort's heating plant at Lake o' the Woods was destroyed by fire early Monday morning according to word received here.

Rogue River national forest rangers from the lake headquarters said the "building seemed to burst into flames all at once." The building stood in the middle of the resort area but a crew from the forest ranger station kept the fire from spreading.

Four additional small forest fires were caused by lightning last week, according to Rogue River officials. The forest patrol reported one small blaze over the weekend, presumably the result of a cigarette dropped along the bank of Butte creek above Eagle point Sunday.

threw it into the courtyard where it burned out.

Many buildings were hit, but they all appeared to be private dwellings.

The Kremlin and other public centers were untouched.

The air raid on Moscow lasted from noon after dusk until nearly dawn, but found Moscow blacked out and camouflaged.

Muscovites, drilled by six previous alarms which had brought no bombing, were said by the Russians to have been steeled for the attack and to have acted calmly.

BERLIN, July 22 (AP)—German air raiders struck heavily at Moscow overnight in an attack officially described as retaliatory, while Adolf Hitler's ground forces were declared to have "torn the soviet frontier defense into a number of disconnected groups."

The first aerial thrust of the war against the soviet capital, the German high command said, was "in retaliation for bolshevist air raids on open capitals of the allies, Bucharest (Rumania) and Helsinki (Finland)."

Bomb hits in the Kremlin district, the heart of Moscow, fires east of the Kremlin and flames that spread throughout the region of the Muskva river bend, the site of power plants and communist party administrations, were reported in Berlin.

"Buildings of high soviet executive and administrative importance as well as supply industries of the city, were destroyed or badly damaged," the high command said.

Informed sources said the thrust was "one of the heaviest carried out by the German air force," comparable only to the most severe attacks on England. The high command described Moscow as "the bolshevist traffic and armament center."

Drunken Driving Cases in Court

Two drunken driving cases and numerous other traffic offenses kept Justice of the Peace Joseph A. Mahoney's court busy on Monday and Tuesday.

Glenn Arthur Thomas was arrested on a drunken driving charge by a state police officer, who said Thomas' car almost hit the state officer's car as they were crossing the South Sixth street viaduct. The officer said he re-crossed the viaduct and followed Thomas, who allegedly was swerving on the street.

Thomas was released on his own recognizance on a not guilty plea, and will appear in court again this week for disposition of the case.

Monroe Faithful, an India was arrested by a state officer on highway No. 97. The officer charged Faithful was drunk and placed a drunken driving charge against him.

He also is accused of having no operator's license.

Traffic complaints in Judge Mahoney's court totalled 14 on Monday and 10 on Tuesday.
