H. V. Mitchell, old time stock buyer in Klamath Lake, Josephine and Jackson counties, died Sunday in Ashland at the age of 70, according to word received here.

Funeral services will be held at the Ashland funeral parlors Wednesday at 2 p. m.

Mr. Mitchell was well known in Klamath county where he bought and sold cattle and sheep over a period of about 30 years.

Trustees Escape From Oregon State Penitentiary

SALEM, July 22 (P)—Two trustees escaped from the Oregon state penitentiary early today while they were about to go to work as cooks in the guards' quarters.

The men, neither considered dangerous by prison officials, changed their clothes in the chief engineers' quarters shortly after being released from a prison dormitory. They took a butcher's knife apiece, and walked away at 5:15 a. m.

The men are: Lauren F. Wallace, 33, sentenced from Benton county a year ago to serve three years for larceny. He had served terms in San Quentin and Folsom prisons in California, and two previous sentences in the Oregon penitentiary.

Virgil J. Akin, 38, who entered prison March 17 from Multnomah county to serve five years for burglary. He had served a sentence in the McNeil island, Wash., prison, and a previous term in the Oregon prison.

Oregon Legion Eyes Problems of Army In Present Stress

EUGENE, July 22 (P)—Problems of the present army dominated thoughts of the U. S. soldiers of 1917-18 as the Oregon American Legion entered the second day of its annual convention today.

State Commander Alfred P. Kelley urged retention of national guardsmen and selectees in the army.

Similar advice came from National Commander Milo J. Warner, Toledo, O., and Governor Sprague, who said: "Eager as I am to have national guardsmen, reserve officers and selectees return home, I think it would be incredibly stupid to send these men home at the end of a year because it would result, as General Marshall says, in virtual disappearance of the armed forces."

Warner said America "cannot afford to have an army that comes and goes with the snow." He announced he had sent a telegram to Sen. Robert McReynolds, chairman of the mili-

tary affairs committee, recommending legislation providing for a permanent system of military training in the United States.

Warner commented on the Russian development in the war by urging greater aid to Britain and strict enforcement of freedom of the seas. The American Legion, he said, is realistic and believes in "following the target," but that "there are some well-meaning citizens who are placing their shots where the target was, not where the target is."

Newsprint paper is now produced in Australia from local hardwood, according to the department of commerce.

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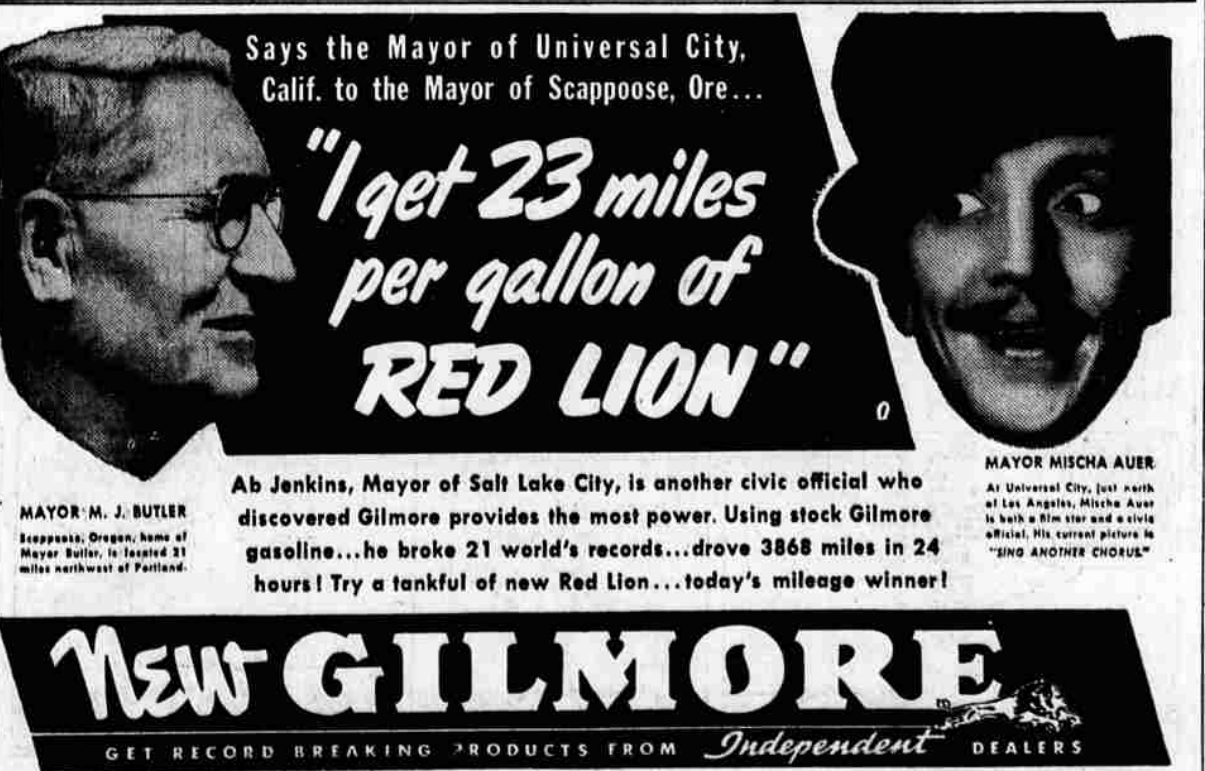
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
