

YACHT'S LOG MIGHT BRING BACK MEMORY

LOS ANGELES, July 22 (AP)—Hope of restoring the memory of Mrs. Fern Thompson, lost on a starvation voyage on which lived in the reek of death, was renewed today on the log of her wrecked sloop.

Mrs. Thompson, 21, is the sole survivor of a quartet which sailed out for the Marquesas islands in the south seas last August 12. They missed Hawaii and Samoa. Their 28-foot sloop, The Wing On, was found wrecked 75 days later—on Nov. 24—in the Fiji islands.

Abroad were Mrs. Thompson, emaciated by starvation, and the corpses of Dalton Conly, 25, of Oakland, Calif., and his wife, Eve, 20. Mrs. Thompson's husband, Chester, 21, had been buried at sea. They had taken only 30 days food supply.

Dr. Samuel C. Benadom and psychologists who have treated Mrs. Thompson since she was brought home said their chief hope of restoring her memory and health was to shock her into remembrance by reading excerpts of the Wing On's log.

A transcript of the log arrived yesterday after Secretary of State Hull had intervened with British officials. Previously, the British had said they could not release the log, says Attorney Robert Neeb, Jr.

Neeb declined to disclose contents of the log "unless and until Mrs. Thompson recovers and chooses to do so herself."

But a vivid description of three horror-filled weeks before she was rescued came from Walwright Abbott, American consul at Suva. In a note accompanying the transcript, he wrote: "After on a rolling pitiless expanse of ocean for nearly two weeks after the death of the yacht owner, Conly, whose decomposed body remained aboard, and three weeks after the death of her husband, who was buried at sea. She lived, indeed, in the reek of death for three weeks."

"The stench of death still oozes from the recovery body cells of this living woman... her sudden mental collapse following the shock of rescue from a position of horror and lonely death..."

Neeb said Thompson starved herself, "heroically yielding his food portions so that the mother of his two babies would survive."

Mrs. Thompson is with her two small children and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alfred H. Mann, here. The Conlys' deaths orphaned their baby.

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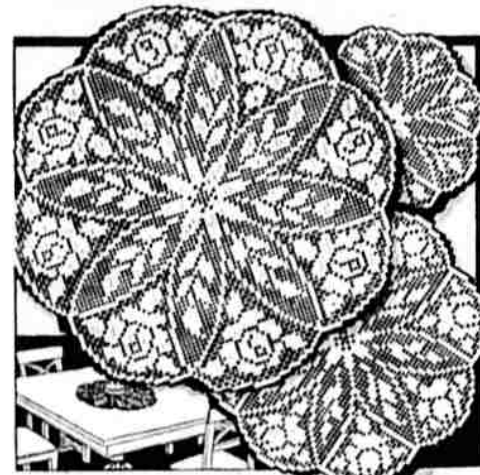

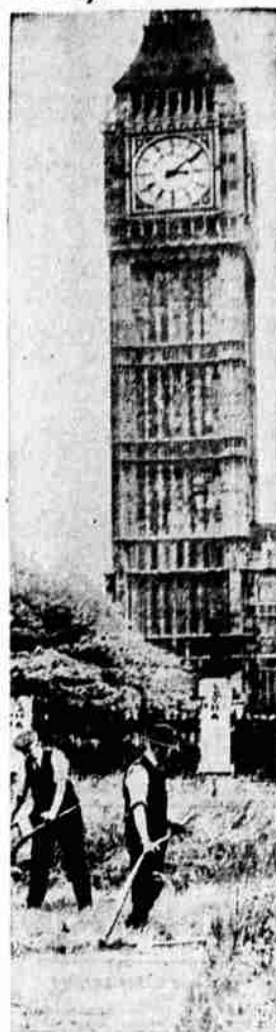
Beth Robley has returned to her post at the switchboard of the local telephone office after recovering from a recent tonsillitis.
