Crecent lake—Still reporting a few big rainbows on troll. Reservations are almost a necessity.

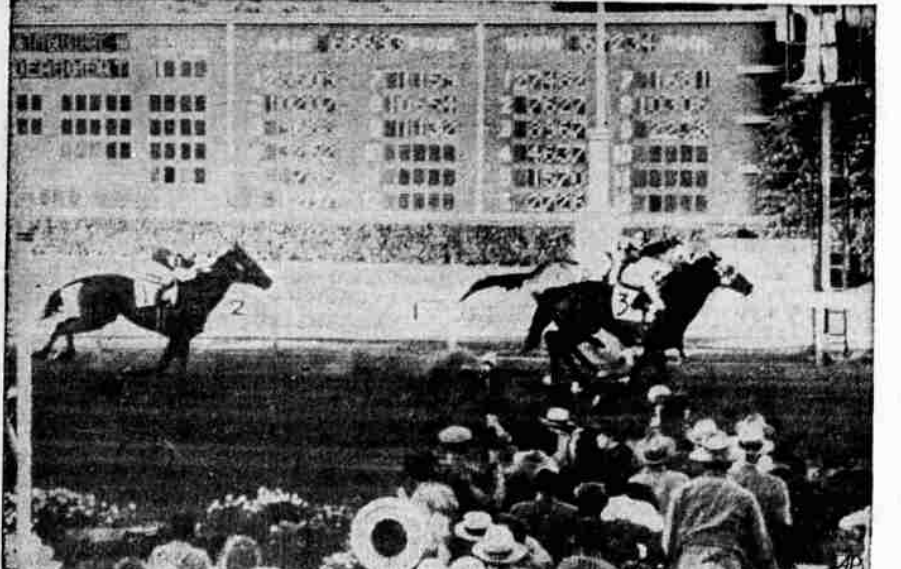
Net Favorites Win In First Rounds

LOS ANGELES, July 22 (AP)—Thirty-six players have been selected to play in the Pacific Coast league's north-south all-star game July 29. But the starting lineups could read almost like a roster of the league-leading Sacramento Sacs and the San Diego Padres or Hollywood Stars.

Seven Sacs were named on the northern outfit, which also will have Manager Pepper Martin of Sacramento as their guiding star. Seattle and Oakland each qualified four players and Portland three. The Oaks also placed Manager Johnny Vergez, as coach.

Six Padres and six Stars are listed on the southern roster, which will be managed by Boss Lefty O'Doul of San Francisco. Skipper Bill Sweeney of Hollywood was named coach. Completing the roster are four Seals and two Angels.

The teams were selected by 40 sports writers from league cities. Proceeds of the game, to be played in San Francisco, will go to the Association of Professional Baseball players of America.
