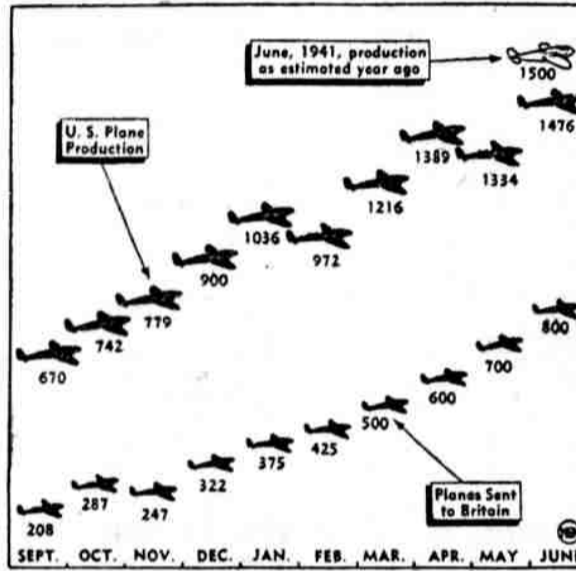

FUNERAL HELD FOR JOHN DAY RIVER VICTIMS

LAKEVIEW, Ore. (Special)—Funeral services were held Monday afternoon from the Methodist church in Lakeview for Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow "Woody" Morris who were drowned in the north fork of the John Day river near Monument Thursday night.

Dr. David Farquharson officiated at the service which were attended by a multitude of sorrowing friends of the young people who were well-known in this community.

The two were drowned about 9:30 p. m. Thursday while wading in the John Day river near their home in Monument. Apparently walking hand in hand into the water, they stepped into a 17-foot hole. Mr. Morris, who was unable to swim, dragged his wife under with him as she attempted to save him. Mrs. Morris' body was recovered about 12:15 a. m. and Mr. Morris' not until 2:30 a. m.

Appoline (Polly) Myers, aged 28 years, was born at Ontario, Oregon March 24, 1913. Miss Myers spent most of her childhood in Lakeview, and attended both grammar and high school here. She continued her education at Oregon State college as a student of the Bernard Daly Educational Fund.

She married Woodrow Morris in Reno, Nevada, August 24, 1934, and to this union were born Laury Givan, aged two years and Woodra Sue, aged eight months. She became a member of the Baptist church at Lakeview at the age of 10 years. Mrs. Morris is survived by her parents, Rev. and Mrs. L. A. Myers, two sisters, Laure A. Myers, of Redding, California and Mrs. Buelah Peterson, of Lakeview, three brothers, Homer A. and Jimmy F. Myers, both of Lakeview and D. O. Myers of Burney, California.

Woodrow Wilson "Woody" Morris, aged 29 years, was born November 30, 1912 at Adel, Oregon. Mr. Morris spent his childhood in Warner and Goose Lake valleys and was a graduate with the class of 1930 of Lakeview high school. He also continued his education at Oregon State college as a member of the Daly Educational Fund.

After completing his education, Mr. Morris was employed with the civilian conservation corps and was recently promoted to acting superintendent of camps in the Grant county district.

He is survived by his two children, Laury, aged 2 years and Woodra Sue, eight months, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Morris, a grandmother, Dora Ellen Givan of Klamath Falls, Oregon, three sisters, Mrs. Hallie Honold, Mrs. Rosta Graham, and Mrs. Ruby Godard, all of Cottage Grove, two brothers, Raymond, of Plush, Oregon, and Truman Morris of Carlin, Nevada.
