Railroad Workers Sought for Skilled Jobs in Defense

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—Sidney Hillman, associate director of the office of production management, called on railroads and their employees' unions Tuesday to consider the transfer of about 100,000 skilled maintenance workers to defense industries.

He announced at the same time that new surveys indicated that a five-fold increase would be necessary in aircraft factory payrolls during the next 12 months, raising employment in the industry from about 200,000 at present to 1,000,000 by July, 1942.

Shipbuilding will require an increase from 375,000 workers to 555,000 in the next 12 months, Hillman said.
