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Judge Hangs 30-Day Sentence on Man For False Alarm

BIEBER, Calif. — Timothy Quill was committed to jail for 30 days by Justice W. B. Phillips when Quill failed to pay a \$50 fine imposed on him for disturbing the peace of Bieber by setting off the town fire alarm siren at 2 a. m., though there was no fire. Shortly after he punched a button under a red light on the outside wall of the telephone office, Quill and two companions were surrounded by displeased volunteer firemen. Quill and the two companions were taken to the station and Fire Chief Gerald Stakwood put the trio in jail and fined each \$50. Quill told the court: "I plead guilty, but I did not do it intentionally. We thought it was a rooming house." The defendants said they worked at Whitehorse.
