SERVICE PERMITS
The Oregon State Game commission is sorry, but they're not empowered to issue special hunting or fishing licenses for service men.

Any man, however, who has lived in the state for six months may obtain a regular resident's permit or a non-resident's permit if he hasn't been in Oregon for a half-year.

Men who have a furlough and wish to fish for a number of days may buy a 10-day permit for the usual \$3.

FISH FLASH
In bait casting, says Heddon Release No. 260, remember that your reel needs regular oiling at the points of greatest friction, namely the two bearings and the level-winding screw and sliding bar. Oil it lightly every day, and when in heavy use, two or three times a day. Keep sand and grit away, if possible, and grease the gears after severe use.

In putting on a new line, use a cork arbor or put on 10 to 15 yards of old line as a filler. To this attach the new line. Reel off your new line so that its spool revolves. Run a pencil or nail through the center. Do not let the line spiral off the edge of the spool with the spool stationary.

HONOLULU, T. H., July 23 (UP)—With all seven entries in the trans-Pacific yacht race from Los Angeles to Honolulu riding at anchor Wednesday, officials sat down to compile corrected times before announcing the winner.

LOS ANGELES, July 23 (AP)—Turkey Thompson, young Los Angeles negro heavyweight, thinks he's climbing up pugilism's ladder of fame. Bob Pastor of New York denies he's skidding down.

NEW YORK, July 23 (UP)—Mello Bettina, southpaw heavyweight contender, took a long stride toward a title shot Tuesday night when he ammerged out a surprisingly easy 10-round decision over Red Burman of Baltimore before 10,167 fans at Ebbets field.

Bettina of Beacon, N. Y., former light heavyweight champion, had the rugged Maryland scrapper on the verge of a knockout several times after stunning him with smashing left hooks to the head. But he was unable to put him away.

Burman—Jack Dempsey's protégé who suffered his lone knockout by Joe Louis in January—was battered badly and bleeding from gashes on the bridge of his nose and on his left brow when the battle ended. Bettina virtually was unmarked, except for a slight gash at the corner of his left eye.

Despite the punishment that Baltimore Red absorbed, there were no knockdowns. However, both fell through the ropes and out onto the ring apron in the fourth round.

The squat, swarthy southpaw

was so superior to Burman that the United Press scored only one round, the eighth, for the Baltimore body-punching specialist. They fought on even terms in the sixth. The other eight rounds went to Bettina, who now is clamoring for a bout with Billy Conn, as an immediate stepping stone to Champion Louis.
