

HIGHWAY 97'S TRAFFIC GAINS 72 PER CENT

Traffic on U. S. highway No. 97 made a gain of 72 per cent in the first six months of 1941 over the same period of 1940, according to figures from the California quarantine service. The gain was largely attributed here Thursday to the fact that the Willamette highway was open in the first six months of this year, but had not been completed in the same period of the previous year.

California quarantine figures also show traffic on No. 97 is running far ahead of other northern gateways into California, including the Pacific highway.

In June, southbound cars at the Dorris (No. 97) entrance numbered 12,269, compared with 9993 over the Pacific highway, 6187 over the Redwood highway and 6096 over the coast highway.

While the quarantine stations keep count of southbound cars only, the figures are regarded as indicative of comparative travel in both directions on the various highways listed. The Dorris quarantine station is south of Dorris and does not count local traffic between Dorris and Klamath Falls.

Tom Stanley, manager of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland, reported Thursday that in the Shasta-Cascade region, foreign car travel showed a gain of 36 per cent in the first six months of 1941.

PENALTY ON WHEAT DECLARED UNJUST

WASHINGTON, July 25 (P) Rep. Leavy (D-Wash.) charged in the house Tuesday that many patriotic American wheat growers were unjustly being penalized through the imposition of a 49 cent a bushel penalty on non-compliance wheat.

Leavy said the Pacific northwest was one of the nation's greatest wheat producing areas and this year, generally speaking, the crop was above normal. "At the time this crop was planted the penalty for producing wheat on excess acreage was 15 cents a bushel, and no farmer could have been advised that it would be otherwise when harvest time came," Leavy said.

"Later we changed the law, increasing parity loans to 85 per cent of parity. In giving application to this increased loan, however, the agriculture department deducts a freight differential of about 12 cents a bushel, then calculates parity on that basis, thus resulting in a loan about 86 cents a bushel to our farmers, instead of 98 cents a bushel.

"At the same time the law provides for a 50 per cent penalty on parity loans without giving any consideration to the freight differential.

"In other words, farmers in my district are discriminated against. The penalty of 49 cents a bushel is calculated on 98 cents per bushel instead of 86 cents that we can get. Therefore our penalty in no event should be more than 43 cents."

Blueberries make vivid and delicious desserts. Here's an old-fashioned recipe:

BLUEBERRY FLUMMERY
(Serves 4)

Two cups fresh blueberry juice, 1 cup sugar, pinch salt, 3 tablespoons cornstarch, 2 tablespoons lemon juice.

Cook blueberries with a little water. Rub through sieve to get the juice. Measure exactly 2 cups.

Combine sugar, cornstarch and salt. Slowly stir in the blueberry juice. Cook in double boiler for about 20 minutes. Stir constantly until thickened, then afterwards occasionally. Add the lemon juice. Pour into glass serving dish. Chill. Serve with plain or whipped cream.

The Danish dish called Rodgrød turns up every year at this time. Served very cold with thick cream, it's a wonderful hot weather dessert.

RODGRÖD
(Serves 4 to 6)

One quart fresh currants, 1 pint fresh red raspberries, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon salt.

Wash currants and raspberries.

**DUKE OF KENT TO

The two unions called a strike against Montgomery Ward in Oakland last Dec. 4, and both the big mail order store and the retail store closed in February. Strike action was taken later in Portland and in several other cities in California and in Oregon.

The unions contended Montgomery Ward management refused to bargain with them or to recognize the unions for the purpose of collective bargaining.

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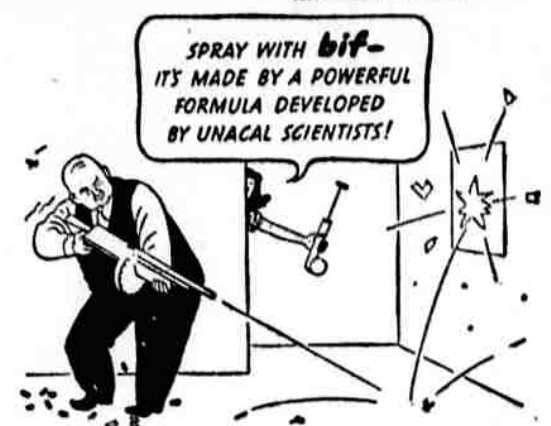
