Pendleton May Absorb Suburbs

PENDLETON, July 26 (AP)—Faced with a city growing by leaps and bounds as a result of national defense activity, Pendleton's city council voted last night to call a special election August 25 and thus give voters a chance to cast ballots on annexing Curry and Phelps additions and on a three-mill addition to the basic tax levy.

The annexation would add to the city property which James Johns, president of the Pendleton Housing corporation, estimates to have present assessed valuation of about \$140,000, figuring \$60,000 for the bare ground and \$80,000 for 20 of the 70 homes to be built on the tract.

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Balloting Starts On Farm Credit District Director

SPOKANE, July 26 (AP)—Balloting to select a successor for the late Ervin E. King of Pullman as district director of the Farm Credit Administration of Spokane began Saturday in the four northwest states and will continue for a month. R. E. Brown, FCA general agent, reported.

King, who was also state grange master, died in June.

Brown said the boards of directors of 225 national farm loan associations in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington would meet individually during the balloting period to cast their associations' votes.

The new director will be chosen from the three names receiving the greatest number of votes.

JOBLESS PAY RULE AFFECTS WORKERS

SALEM, July 26 — Seasonal workers unavailable for other jobs may not serve waiting weeks for unemployment benefits outside of their regular season. Seasonal employees, however, who customarily engage in other work may serve their two waiting weeks during any jobless period.

These legal definitions were set forth in a recent decision by a referee for the state unemployment compensation commission. The difference between seasonal "workers" and "employees" is based largely on availability for other work as shown by employment records.

A Salem cannery worker asked benefits after serving waiting weeks outside of the regular season from June 8 to October 11. The decision disqualified her because of a 15-year job record showing rare periods of work outside of canneries.

In other seasonality cases recently decided, claimants established rights to benefits as well as waiting periods during the off-season. One showed earnings greater than possible benefits in half of his off-season weeks, while the other actively entered the labor market during the shutdown period.

Changes in seasonality law and regulations will be put into effect in 1942. Weekly wage reports now being gathered by the commission will form the basis for new determinations, while "seasonal employees" are to be restricted to those earning 75 per cent of their annual wages within the primary season.

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LARGEST DIAMOND CUTS SUCCESSFUL

NEW YORK, July 26 (AP)—The first step toward the division of the 726.60-carat Presidente Vargas diamond into \$2,000,000 in cut stones has been completed successfully.

After months of study, Adrian Grascally, a veteran diamond cutter, cleaved a 160-carat section from the fourth-largest diamond in history in a nerve-tangling operation that left him physically weak after striking three precision blows.

Prior to the cutting, the Vargas, rough and blue-white, was considered the largest uncut diamond in existence.

It was found in 1938 by Joaquim Evancia in the dry bed of the Rio Santo Antonio, near Coromandel, Brazil. Later it was bought by the Hollandsche Unie Bank-Financed Syndicate in Rio de Janeiro and sold to Harry Winston, a New York diamond merchant.

The stone was named after President Vargas of Brazil.

Quarantines on Alfalfa Removed

SALEM, July 26 (AP)—Repeal of two quarantine orders dealing with alfalfa weevil as of October 1 was ordered today by Director J. D. Mickle of the state department of agriculture.

Mickle also announced that two quarantines pertaining to strawberry yellows would be canceled late in August.



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
