TULELAKE—Flower growers of the Klamath and Tulelake basins are invited by the Tulelake Garden club to enter exhibits in the annual flower show, only one to be held in the southern section of the basin this fall which is scheduled for Sunday, August the third in the Legion hall. Mrs. Lee Dixon, past president of the club, responsible for the successful display a year or so ago, will again serve as general chairman.

Late summer blooms should be at their best by early August and committees in charge are anxious that anyone having blooms will plan to cooperate.

The instructions for exhibitors as released by Mrs. Theodore J. Fish, president, follows:

Entries are open to anyone who wishes to exhibit. All exhibits must be in by eleven o'clock. Cash prizes to be given to children's exhibits only.

Specimen schedule: We wish to make this an outstanding exhibit of flowers, and a rose bush will be given to the one exhibiting the most outstanding specimen in the whole group.

1. Roses, one, stem or spray not to exceed eight inches; 2. Gladioli, one; 3. Sweet Peas, five; 4. Phlox, one; 5. Petunias, three; 6. Zinnias, three; 7. Nasturtiums, three; 8. Snapdragons, one. Also any other specimen of perennial or annual you may have blooming in your garden.

Arrangement schedule: A grand prize will be awarded to the exhibitor having the largest total points won by ribbons. A blue ribbon scores five, a red ribbon three and white one.

1. Patriotic arrangement. 2. Arrangement in pitchers. 3. Arrangement of weeds. 4. Living room arrangements. Twelve inches or over. End or coffee table. 5. Dining room arrangements, table, buffet. 6.
