Sheriff Orders Repairs on Jail Window Screens

Sheriff Lloyd Low had a man from the county shops busy at the county jail Friday closing up holes in screens which have been cut by prisoners.

Screen-cutting is common at the county jail. Through the holes the prisoners drop notes or catch a bottle of wine or other drink from some friend on the ground below.

Friday's activity at the jail provoked an incident, when an interior glass panel at the jail was broken by a prisoner, evidently with a broomhandle.

Officers suspected J. R. (Tex) Williams, convicted Friday on a forgery charge. Williams was placed in solitary confinement. He will be sentenced Saturday morning, and if he gets a penitentiary term he will leave that morning for Salem.

LONG APPOINTED TO POST AT HERMISTON

C. D. Long, for the past several years business agent for the Klamath local of the AFL-Carpenter's union, has been appointed to the post of labor relations man on the giant Hermiston, Ore., ammunition dump construction job, it was announced Friday.

Mr. and Mrs. Long will leave Saturday morning for eastern Oregon.

The unionist was appointed by Clarence D. Barker, chief west coast US army liaison officer on the recommendation of the State Building Trades council. The job will involve ironing out difficulties between some 3500 men on the defense project and the J. A. Terteling company, contractors. Present schedule calls for completion of the work by mid-spring of 1942.

Long's successor here has not been named.

Yakima, Skagit Spud Growers Cooperate

MOUNT VERNON, Wash., July 26 (AP)—Usually competitors, the potato growers of Yakima and Skagit counties got together last night to work out an agreement on prices for No. 2 tubers. Growers said that because of low prices they may divert some of the second grade spuds into livestock feed.

An agreement is already in effect on No. 1 potatoes, on which prices also were deemed too low.

LOCAL PICKET LINE PASSERS TO FACE FINES

Three Klamath Falls union locals have voted to fine members passing the Culinary Alliance (AFL) picket line in the latest development in the seven-week old J. J. Newberry strike, it was announced Saturday.

Lumber and Sawmill workers local 2568, Algoma; LSU local 2649 at Kesterson Lumber company and Teamsters local 911 have balloted to assess members \$10 if the line is not respected, according to G. C. Tatman, alliance secretary. The fine also applies to members' wives, Tatman said.

The Main street Newberry store was struck June 6, following several weeks of negotiations between the alliance and the Restaurant and Caterer's association over a pay boost to waitresses, cooks, dishwashers and bartenders.

Crux of the Newberry dispute is the question of whether or not the store's top cook shall be listed as manager.

Meanwhile the alliance Saturday was planning to post a blackboard in the Labor temple bearing the names of offenders against the picket line.
