MACK TO TALK AT TAX CLINIC IN PORTLAND

Charles H. Mack, assessor of Klamath county and president of the Oregon Assessors' association, will speak on "Uniform or Varying Assessment Ratios," at the all-Oregon tax clinic to be held in Portland, September 15, under auspices of the Oregon Business and Tax Research, Inc., F. H. Young, manager of the firm, announced Saturday.

Young expects Mack's talk to be one of the session's highlights, inasmuch as a number of problems have arisen in assessment of property in Oregon since the state tax commission's April 21 ruling that held varying assessment ratios to be illegal.

Klamath county uses a uniform assessment, so Mack's remarks should be particularly pertinent to Multnomah county property owners on account of the present change in that county from a varying to a uniform assessment basis, Young declared.

Mack's discussion of assessment procedure in Oregon will precede by two days the 1941 annual meeting of Oregon assessors in Klamath Falls, where he will preside over the 3-day session of the Oregon Assessors' association, September 17, 18 and 19.

So much interest has been expressed in the Oregon tax clinic, that a Washington delegation is coming to Portland to attend it. Young was informed in a letter Saturday from Floyd Oles, manager of the Washington Taxpayers' association. The Washington delegation is particularly interested in the discussion on "Relative Advantages to Industry of the Oregon and Washington Tax Systems," Oles wrote.

Others to accept invitations to appear on the tax clinic program include: Ernest R. Fatland of Condon, speaker of the 1939 house of representatives and vice president of the Oregon Taxpayers' federation, second congressional district; State Senator W. H. Steiwer of Fossil, chairman of the 1941 legislature's senate committee on assessment and taxation; Claude Buchanan of Corvallis, president of the Oregon Taxpayers' federation and a member of the 1941 interim committee; State Budget Director David Eccles, chairman of the interim committee and H. O. Pargeter, Roseburg, secretary of the Douglas County Tax association.
