

Bigbills Lick Hens, Tie for First Spot

Medford Downs Sox; Davids Here Tonight

Klamath Falls Oregon State league Pelicans had little difficulty overcoming the cellarite Toledo nine, 7-3, Sunday afternoon at Recreation field in a contest that served as a warm-up for the Israelite House of David tilt to be played at the local park tonight starting at 8 p. m.

The Davids, featuring a classy "pepper game" involving those wizards of diamond trickery, Tucker, Tally and Clay, will engage the Bigbills in a regular nine-inning fracas that is liable to develop into quite a ball game. Fun, action and the annual glimpse of the bearded boys are promised all those who attend this evening's classic under the lights of the local athletic enclosure.

Tie for First
Yesterday's win over the Mud Hens put the Pelicans in a four-way tie for first place in State loop rankings. Medford, Albany, Silverton and Klamath Falls all have now won three and lost one in second half league play. Medford upset the dope bucket Sunday at home by shutting out the Silverton outfit, 7-0, and thereby threw the four clubs into a deadlock.

Toledo started out strong Sunday, punching out three hits to score two runs in the initial frame. However, the locals easily offset that temporary disadvantage by tallying four runs of their own on two hits and an error. Left Fielder Norm Peters smashed a 350-foot homer out of the park to score Jack Lloyd ahead of him and climax the four-run spurge.

Another Run
Another marker crossed the plate for the Pelicans in the third when Paul Crapo singled to center, stole second and moved up a base on each of two flies hit to center field by Peters and Paul Bernadou.

Final two runs for the winners were scored by Center Fielder Jack Mahoney and Second Baseman Ernie Bishop, both of whom singled to open the fourth stanza. Mahoney had gone to third on Bishop's slash to right and the latter stole second to put both in position to score with nobody out. Two outfielder flies to center by Lloyd and Crapo turned the trick to give the home contingent a 7-2 lead.

Bishop Clubs
Sam Hoover, southpaw-hitting second baseman of the visitors, completed the scoring for the day when he clouted a home run over the right field wall in the first of the seventh with no one on the bases.

Manager Bishop added 29 points to his healthy State league batting average by clubbing out three hits in four trips to the plate off the youthful

Mud Hen hurler, Leonard Anderson. He now has a 476 mark as a result of 20 safeties in 42 attempts.

Peters and Mahoney of the Bigbills and Sammy Hoover of the Toledo nine collected two hits apiece in the league tilt. Fielding of the two center gardeners, Mahoney of the locals and Jim Anderson of the Mud Hens, was particularly outstanding. The former had six put-outs while the latter had five, one of which was a sensational grab against the boards of Peters' blow to center in the fourth inning.

Next week the Pelicans travel to Eugene followed by three loop games at home to close the season. Medford's Craters come here Sunday, August 10, while the Hills Creek nine plays two league games here, Saturday and Sunday, August 16 and 17.

There is little argument among the stars with whom he plays that the 33-year old Smith is the best putter golf has seen in years. There was no argument yesterday on that point among the 7,000 spectators who saw the Pinehurst, N. C., professional turn his wizardry into a great final round 63 that brought him the St. Paul open championship and its \$1,600 prize money.

Barring accidents or a streak of bad luck, the Sacramento Senators should have an easy time riding to the Coast league championship.

The loop leading Senators split a doubleheader with the San Diego Padres yesterday, losing the first, 3 to 2, but taking the seven-inning nightcap, 5 to 0.

That marked the start of a campaign which raised approximately \$2,659 for Ol' Pete. The money was given to Alexander once a week as it was received.

Friday, on the day on which Lefty Grove became the first pitcher to win 300 major league games since Alexander accomplished the feat nearly 17 years ago, Parker called Ol' Pete at his apartment and told him to come by and pick up some stray contributions.

"He was asleep when I called," Parker said. "But he said he'd be by. He looked in excellent condition when he came by later and some of the boys in the city room remarked how well he looked. He didn't have any fat on him and he had the carriage of a soldier. He was in good spirits when he left me."

That was the last heard of Alexander until he was found on the street.

The Brooklyn Dodgers are wobbling on the edge of a precipice—and everybody is wondering whether they will get pushed off, or just fall over of their own accord.

They dropped another double header to the Pittsburgh Pirates yesterday, 4-3 and 8-0, to fall two full games behind the St. Louis Cardinals in the struggle for the National league pennant.

A crowd of 40,903 that overflowed behind ropes all around the Forbes field outfield encouraged the Pirates.

The Cardinals were not especially impressive yesterday in dividing a double header with the Boston Braves. They lost the first, 12-10, and took the second, 8-6.

Cincinnati split a pair with the Phillies in a "Paul Derringer Day" program. Derringer won the opener, 2-0, with five-hit pitching, but the Reds made only four hits themselves and both runs were scored on a wild pitch by Boom Boom Beck, who hasn't captured a verdict this year.

John Podgajny then held the Reds to four hits in the nightcap and triumphed 8-1. Bucky Walters was charged with the defeat.

The Chicago Cubs stopped the New York Giants in a single tilt, 9-2. Vern Olsen and Jake Mooty held the Terrymen to seven hits.

In the American league, the New York Yankees finally were beaten after winning nine in a row. They took the first half of a doubleheader from the Chicago White Sox, 9-5, but lost the second, 7-3, to Lefty Thornton Lee.

This still left them 11½ games in front of the Cleveland Indians. Cleveland salvaged a 4-0 decision out of its Boston series with Joe Heving holding the Red Sox to six hits and getting timely hitting support.

Ol' Pete Injured in New York

NEW YORK, July 28 (UP)
A taxi cab driver and a cop picked up Grover Cleveland Alexander—Ol' Pete of immortal baseball fame—in the street early Saturday morning and rushed him to Bellevue hospital with deep lacerations over his left eye, a possible skull fracture and a brain hemorrhage.

He was reported delirious in the early hours, but Monday reports from the Bellevue staff gave his condition as "steadily improving."

This is the third time "Alexander the Great," who won 373 games—more than any other National league pitcher—during his 20-year career, has been found on the street in bad condition in the past five years. It happened in August, 1936 in Evansville, Ind., and

again early in 1937 at Springfield, Ill.

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Beaten in Classic



Ended yesterday in the Classic turf encounter at Chicago was Whirlaway's brilliant record of victories. Whirlaway's Streak Snapped At Chicago

Outsider Named Attention Upsets Favorite; Bushwhacker in Third

CHICAGO, July 28 (UP)—Whirlaway's gaudy chain of triumphs was snapped with shocking suddenness Saturday when an unsung outsider named Attention matched him stride for stride in the stretch and then ran away and left him for a story-book victory in the \$40,000 Classic stakes.

In a race crammed with thrills, the unheralded Corning colt came driving across the finish line a full length and a half of golden sunshine ahead of the horse who 50,000 delirious onlookers had believed unbeatable.

For almost two minutes the huge throng stood spell-bound and speechless at a sight few railbirds ever had expected to see. Then the roar broke and the grandstands of Arlington park literally rocked until the garlands of flowers were slipped around Attention's neck and his handsome price — \$21.00—was flashed on the board.

13 Jinx
As a spectacle, the 13th and jinx—running of the rich middle-western fixture was strictly a repetition of the downfalls of Twenty Grand, Johnstown and Bimelech in the years gone by. It started out as a walk-over—Whirlaway against the field at odds of 2-5—and it ended as another of history's great upsets.

Far the first mile it appeared Whirlaway would romp home just as he had in sweeping the Kentucky derby, the Preakness, the Belmont stakes and three other consecutive triumphs. He made his move at the mile pole and he closed ground just as he had so many times before. But there on the turn he found a horse who had heart, and although he fought it out all down the straightaway the best he could do was run second and take down \$7500 instead of the \$42,500 which would have lifted him into eighth position among all-time money winners.

NEWARK, N. J., July 28 (P)—Freddie (Red) Cochrane, product of the same Elizabeth block that gave Mickey Walker to the boxing ring, will try tonight to gain the welterweight crown once held by the famed top bulldog. Although conceded little chance by the experts in his 15-round title bout with Champion Fritzie Zivic of Pittsburgh, the 26-year-old redhead is confident he will succeed just as his boyhood idol did back in 1922.

For the first time in his seven-year professional career, Freddie has placed a wager on himself.

The betting fraternity, figuring Zivic's boxing ability will overcome Cochrane's aggressiveness, have installed the champion as a 4-to-1 favorite.
