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STOCK MARKET SUFFERS FROM PROFIT TAKING

NEW YORK, July 29 (AP) — The stock market was beset with profit cashing troubles today and, while an assortment of favorites overrode barriers, many leaders stumbled into losing territory.

Transfers were in the neighborhood of 1,000,000 shares.

News influences were almost a standoff. Wall street remained bullish for business and the improved chances of the Russians against the nazis. Also there still was a dash of inflationary tonic in the speculative stimulant.

Carrier stocks held up well today, along with scattered rubbers and specialties.

Crucible steel common and preferred were weak throughout. In the backward division were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngtown Sheet, Douglas Aircraft, American Telephone, Allied Chemical, Du Pont and Consolidated Edison.

Doodrich pushed up to a new high for the year on an initial sale of 3500 shares. Savage Arms, Southern Railway and Texas Corp. were among those in new high ground for the move. Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Goodyear and J. I. Case were in front the greater part of the time.

WHEAT UP AFTER OPENING TUMBLE

CHICAGO, July 29 (AP) — Wheat futures after an opening dip gained strength from rye to day and at times extended the gains to as much as a cent a bushel over the previous close for the September delivery.

All deliveries of rye advanced into new high ground for the season, largely on buying by mills and distillers who recognized the comparative cheapness of this cereal. Soybeans and lard continued under pressure most of the session, reflecting the weakness of the cotton and cottonseed oil markets.

Final prices were fractionally under the day's best levels.

Wheat closed 1-1/2 cents higher than Monday's final prices, September \$1.07-1.08 1/2, December \$1.08 1/2-1; corn was 1-1/2 cents lower, September 75 1/2, December 76 1/2 and oats were unchanged.
