

MISSIONARIES TO JEWS APPEAR HERE

Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock in the First Presbyterian church, Miss Camilla Goodrich and Mira Bell Schilling, who have been in different European countries ministering to the Jews, will present motion and still pictures portraying their work. The motion pictures will be in natural colors. The talks will center on personal experiences in France, Poland and Czechoslovakia just before the war. They will answer the question, "Why is Europe in its present condition?" Miss Goodrich is a Presbyterian who has spent some ten years in this work and Miss Schilling some twenty years, under the "European Christian Mission," with headquarters in Brooklyn, New York.

The following invitation was extended by Rev. Theodore A. Smith, pastor of the Presbyterian church: "The lot of the Jews in Europe never has been easy, but has been one of persecution of the most severe type in recent years. To bring the message of Christ to them in their distress and to seek to alleviate their sufferings have been the endeavors of these and other missionaries. It is hoped that the Jewish

people of Klamath Falls, as well as the Christian people, may avail themselves of this opportunity to hear first hand information as to actual conditions in Europe."

Thomas Convicted Of Drunk Driving

Klamath Birth Rate Soars To All-Time High in 1941

Klamath county trailed along with the rest of the nation in bringing the 1941 birth rate to an all-time high, according to figures prepared by Dr. Peter H. Rozendal, Klamath county health officer.

An increase of 21.5 per cent was reported in June, 1941, births over June, 1940, according to Dr. Rozendal, and an increase of 11.3 per cent for the first six months of 1941 as compared to that same period in 1940.

In June of this year there were 107 births as compared to 36 deaths; May, 1941, births 94; deaths 27; June, 1940, births 88, deaths 27; first six months of 1941, births 481, deaths 176; same period, 1940, births 432, deaths 180.

Figures show that during 1940 approximately 1,500,000 couples marched to the altar—in Klamath county alone marriages totaled 213—the greatest tying of nuptial knots in the nation's history, statisticians claim. Provisional figures indicate that the marriage rate jumped from 8.9 in 1939, to 11.8 in 1940.

Increased economic prosperity and selective service are primarily responsible, license officials here and elsewhere indi-

cate. The rise probably is whitening away part of the "vast backlog" of marriages postponed during depression years. In 1932 the marriage rate stood at 7.9, the lowest point in the country's recorded history.

Only once in the past 25 years has the 1940 rate been exceeded. In 1920, following the demobilization of the army after the World War, the rate reached 12 marriages per 1000 population.

After falling steadily for two generations, the long-range United States birth rate has also turned sharply upward. Provisional tabulations show 2,353,988 births reported in 1940, an increase of 91,260 over final 1939 figures. The birth rate per 1000 population jumped from 17.3 to 17.9.

During the first four months of 1941, about 20,000 more babies were born in the United States than in the first third of 1940.

If present birth and death rates continue, as national as well as Klamath county figures show, the population of the United States will increase approximately seven per cent per generation.

Rates based on the depression years indicated that the population would decrease about four per cent per generation.
