S. P. PLANS WEED KILLING PROJECT

MERRILL—Southern Pacific rights of way from Modoc Point to the California state line are to be shorn of weeds this summer under a contract between the railway company and Klamath county, it was announced this week by James Rodgers, who is supervising work on the project.

Two men employed by the county and four by the railway company are spraying a cheap grade of diesel oil on white top, morning glory and Russian rag weed, the project to be financed by the company.

Five to eight gallons of oil are used over each square rod application, and three applications are to be made. It is expected that 3000 square rods will be covered on the main line, 2100 of the total to be oiled between Klamath Falls and Merrill.

The railway project is augmented by the county weed killing program on county roads, ditches, drain ditch canals and other public property where sodium chlorate and carbon bisulphide are being sprayed from a truck. War is also being waged this season on water hemlock, with all tops and roots of this treacherous poison weed being burned. William Gleim is supervising use of he truck.

Few residents of the basin recognize this weed, those in charge of the project stated.

Rancher Charges Lumber Companies Polluted Water

ALTURAS — A \$200,000 damage suit which has been under scrutiny during the past four weeks, was given to the jury by Superior Judge C. A. Paulson of Trinity county, who has been hearing the case.

Howard Wendt, rancher of Widow valley, located in the southwestern part of the county, is suing the Red River Lumber company, the McCloud Lumber company, and the California Cedar Products company for the amount asked.

Wendt claims that the companies in their timbering and lumbering operations, polluted the stream he uses for irrigation and home use. Five women and seven men are jurors in the case.

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Central Oregon

SPUD CROP SHORT

REDMOND, July 31 (AP)—A 700-car potato crop, considerably below normal, is predicted for central Oregon by warehouse fieldmen who have been inspecting Deschutes fields.

The shortage is attributed to seed rot due to a cold, wet spring, and to anticipated lack of irrigation water for the latter part of the growing season.
