

MILLMEN CALL CONFERENCE ON LUMBER NEEDS

TACOMA, July 31 (AP)—Members of the West Coast Lumbermen's association were to confer today with Dr. Wilson Compton, secretary of the National Lumber Manufacturers association, on supplying government requirements and maintaining essential service to normal commercial trade requirements.

Conferees issued a statement that:

"The expanding program of building wooden boats for the navy and coast guard is particularly dependent on high quality Douglas fir. Fifty new coast guard boats may be authorized shortly, and possibly 200 more speed boats will be built. Steel merchant ships, of the 'big duck' type, of which 350 are on contract, each require about 100,000 feet of lumber."

They said that "92,500 new cars were on order July 1, and 30,000 more will be ordered by January 1; 120,000 cars are scheduled for 1942, and 150,000 for 1943."

"Defense housing is consuming from 12 to 15 million feet of lumber per week. New units, under federal agencies, are now being completed at the rate of 2500 per week. Housing Coordinator Palmer has stated that there will be need for 525,000 housing units in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1942, with the government building 125,000 and private industry the remainder."

"Should the present army be kept intact and several hundred thousand more men inducted, a new cantonment program possibly will require 350 million feet of lumber."

"Increased demand for aircraft spruce, obtainable only on the North Pacific coast, is expected, and England is using Douglas fir in plane construction. The US corps of engineers has laid out numerous projects for harbor improvements, wharves, supply depots, and similar jobs taking large quantities of lumber. "Estimates of lumber needs for grain storage vary from 100 million to 300 million board feet."

MacVeagh Named Iceland Minister

WASHINGTON, July 31 (AP)—Lincoln MacVeagh of Connecticut was nominated by President Roosevelt today to be minister of Iceland, recently occupied by American naval forces.

MacVeagh recently returned to this country from service as minister to Greece.

The United States has been represented in Iceland by a consul since last year. Another diplomatic representative, a vice consul, was sent to Iceland a little more than a month ago.

President Roosevelt also nominated Brigadier General Lewis B. Hershey to be director of selective service.

He has been serving as acting director since the resignation several months ago of Dr. Clarence A. Dykstra, president of the University of Wisconsin.

Interesting Stories About Klamath Animals and Efforts in Their Behalf

Rufus, Lola Marie and Wister, Whisenant's Blonde Cocker, is a lonely dog today. Lola Marie and Wister are lonely, too, for Tom, their beloved cat was hit by a car yesterday and died shortly afterward. Whoever hit Tom did not take the trouble to report it but left Tom to drag himself to his yard where all possible aid was given when he was discovered. However it was too late to save him.

Rufus and Tom have been great companions ever since Tom, a little black kitten, came to live at Rufus' house. To Rufus it always seemed that the little kitten was his particular charge and as Tom grew up they grew closer together. Around and around the house they would chase until tired out, then they would flop at the feet of their master or mistress and proceed to tidy each other up. Tom would lick Rufus and Rufus would lick Tom. Once Tom thought he could give Inky Garcelon the beating of his life but Rufus thought this was not proper behavior on the part of either cat. He took it upon himself to separate them, chasing Inky to a proper distance and herding Tom firmly into his own backyard. Last night it was necessary to take Tom to the Animal Shelter where he was gently laid to rest and now Rufus wonders why Tom doesn't come home. When night fell he took his mistress by the hand and led her to the door and when the door was opened he waited—and wondered.

Hit and run drivers leave aching hearts behind. Two homes on Summers Lane are sad from the careless criminality of hit and run drivers this week and two pets beloved by their owners were left to die uncared for as far as the drivers of the cars could know. Contrasted with this was the kindness shown by two young men driving over East Main street this week. An aged dog walked out from between two parked cars into the path of the drivers who were unable to avoid him. They immediately stopped, picked up the old dog, located his owner and helped call the ambulance from the Animal Shelter, but it was not possible to save the old fellow's life. Then they correctly reported the matter to the police department.

One must be convinced that young men like these come from fine homes where humanity and kindness are the rule and property rights of others are regarded at all times. On the contrary drivers who hit and run must have been raised in deplorable surroundings where quarreling and nagging make up the lives of the family, where selfishness prevails and the rights of others are continually trampled upon. The law makes no allowances for lack of proper training in childhood, and it is STILL a PENAL OFFENSE to hit an animal and not report the matter and not offer first aid. The destruction of any personal property, (and pets come under this heading) belonging to others is a penal offense. Whenever it is possible to obtain the license number of hit and run drivers it is urged that this be done and reported to the police.

Showers Relieve Eastern Heat

Widely scattered showers and thunderstorms brought relief today to much of the area still sweltering from the year's worst heat wave.

Most of the baked eastern two-thirds of the nation enjoyed falling temperatures starting Monday but readings of 102 were taken yesterday in Carbondale, Ill., and Oklahoma City, and 101 in St. Louis.

Warmer weather, meanwhile, was moving eastward from the northern plains states and was expected to reach Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin tomorrow. The heat wave cost 346 lives, 178 by prostration and 168 by drowning.

Mrs. Batman was born August 26, 1875 in Bland county, Virginia and was 65 years, 10 months and 29 days old at her death. Early in her childhood her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Bird, moved from Virginia to Kansas where she grew to womanhood. She married Charles Marion Batman in Kansas on May 9, 1900 and in March, 1917, they moved to the Westside where they engaged in farming.

She was the mother of nine children of whom seven survive: Mrs. Opal Fitzgerald, Lakeview; Mrs. Mary Ruby Depuy, Rogue River; Mrs. Bethene Hill, Vallejo, Calif.; George and Dee Batman, Westside; Cecil Batman, Lakeview; and Charles Willis Batman of Klamath Falls.

She is also survived by her husband and her 87 year old mother, Mrs. Victoria Torrance, Larned, Kansas; three brothers in Kansas and one brother in Modesto, Calif. There are also 11 grandchildren.

month and 15 days old at the time of her death. She was married to Clarence W. Anderson in Helena, Mont., a few years previous to their moving to Lakeview in 1909. Mr. Anderson engaged in the mercantile business finally disposing of his property and moving to a farm on the Westside two years before his death in 1928. She continued to operate the farm until her recent illness.
