Bigbills Play Final Road Tilts at Eugene

Two Games Slated for Weekend

Season Edges Toward Close; Three More Loop Contests Played at Home

Gunning seriously for the Oregon State league second half baseball title, Klamath's Pelicans take to the road again this weekend for the final series of games away from home for the 1941 season. The Bigbills journey to Eugene for an exhibition contest Saturday night at Civic stadium against the Athletics and stay over for a State loop encounter against the same club the next afternoon.

Following the Sunday clash with the Eugene nine, which the locals defeated twice here, 12-9 and 9-5, early in June, Manager Ernie Bishop's lads have three more league encounters before the season officially closes for this year. The Medford Craters come here Sunday, August 10, while the Hills Creek Hill Billies whom the Pelicans have not faced as yet engage the Klamathites here in two loop frays, one Saturday night, August 16, and the other Sunday afternoon, August 17.

Personnel as well as management of the Eugene club has changed considerably since the Athletics played here almost two months ago. Dick Bishop, the husky, hard-hitting catcher, replaced Andy Hurney, regular right fielder, as manager of the University city contingent several weeks ago. Hurney left the Athletics to take up residence in Bend where he will help coach the high school athletic teams next year.

Outfielders Dick Whitman and Bill Carney, who are now with the Silverton Red Sox, were the two players that caused Klamath pitchers so much trouble when Eugene came here for a two-game series. Between them they collected 10 hits, including two homers, a triple and a double, during the course of the week-end.

Despite the loss of these two slugging outer gardeners, the Athletics have a formidable squad that likely will give the Pelicans plenty of competition. Two weeks ago Silverton's Red Sox were forced to go 10 innings before downing Eugene, 5-4. Norman "Nig" Mebusius, the smooth-fielding first sacker, and Barney Koch and Bill Hampel, infielders from the University of Oregon, together with Manager Bishop, form a potent hitting quartet that may be too much for the Pelicans.

However, the locals, too, have a distance-hitting crew that will get its share of base hits. Left Fielder Norm Peters has apparently just found his batting eye as evidenced by the long clouts he has been getting in recent contests. Crapo, Lloyd, Mahoney and Bishop all have been hitting well, and there is no reason to believe that they will let up against the Athletics.

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Deer Season Opens On California Coast

Estimated 100,000 Hunters Will Scout Bucks During Long Season

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 1 (UP)—California's "early" deer season for coastal counties opened today and state officials estimated that nearly 100,000 hunters will take to the field during the 46-day season.

Game wardens reported generally good hunting prospects in northern areas, rather poor herds in the counties immediately surrounding San Francisco bay and spotty conditions in counties south of San Francisco.

Districts opening today are 11, 2, 21, 21 and 3. They include territory from the southern Monterey county line north to and including a small coastal portion of Humboldt county. The coast line is the western boundary and the eastern slope of the coast range in the San Joaquin valley and the Sacramento river north of Sacramento is the eastern boundary.
