

Order Numbers of New Draftees Listed Here

Men Registered On July 1 Given Relative Position

Youths registered in the second selective service call July 1 now have been given places in the regular draft lists of Board 1 and Board 2, as indicated in the following lists.

The following information given by Klamath draft offices, may be used in interpreting the numbers that precede the names:

The names in these lists are arranged alphabetically to make individual names easier to find and the order in which they are listed has nothing whatever to do with the order in which they will be called for classification.

The number column, headed order numbers, indicate the relative positions of the new names in the order lists established when the first draft lottery was held in Washington last year.

The new names have been spaced evenly through the old lists by the use of a system established by the proportion of new names to old names.

Thus on Board 1 there are 35 old names between each two new names, and on Board 2 there are 24 old names between each two new names.

However, due to the drafting or deferring of large groups of men since July 1, both boards have already reached higher numbers than the lowest of those on the following lists.

From the old list, men with numbers up to 912 on Board 1 and up to 1888 on Board 2 have been ordered to report for induction on August 5. Therefore, men who registered on July 1 and whose order numbers are lower than these, may look for the possibility they may be classified, examined and called to report in September.

Of the new registrants, 19 men on Board 1 and 55 on Board 2 have order numbers lower than those already called.

Questionnaires have already been mailed to new registrants up to number 1916 on Board 1 and 3950 on Board 2. The lists follow:

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\$94,520 in Gold Recovered From Friant Dam Project

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (P)—Recovery of gold valued at \$94,520 from the sand, gravel and rock being excavated for construction of Friant dam in the Central valley reclamation project of California was reported Wednesday by John C. Page, reclamation commissioner.

Page said the gold had been recovered since last August, at a cost of \$18,534 including construction of a reduction plant. It was explained, however, that the cost did not include the expense of moving the sand, gravel and rock, which was charged against construction of the dam.

Under an agreement with the reclamation bureau, the Friant dam contractor turns over one-half the gold recovered to the bureau.

Army Gets Bids On Lumber Orders

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1 (P)—Successful bids on parts of the 17,000,000-board-foot army lumber order for 13 projects were entered by 50 of 85 Pacific coast lumbermen, army officials said today.

Of the total to be sent to various parts of the United States, Hawaii and Trinidad, 12,000,000 board feet will be cut in Oregon and Washington.

Successful bidders were not identified at the close of the two-day quartermaster general's auction.

U. S., CANADA MAY DEFER GOLD TRADE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (P)—The joint Canadian-United States economic defense board was working today on a plan for this nation to switch from buying a yearly total of \$200,000,000 worth of Canadian gold to its place strategic base metals vital to defense preparations.

The United States already has some \$22,700,000,000 in gold—approximately 80 per cent of the world's monetary gold supply—under guard at Fort Knox, Ky., and elsewhere and, as one official remarked, "certainly no one wants more gold to bury when we need metals for bombs and bombs."

Authoritative sources disclosed that the Canadian and United States board members have reached an agreement calling for greatly increased American purchases from Canada of aluminum, asbestos, antimony, bauxite, copper, nickel, sulphur, zinc, chrome, brass, cobalt, magnesium, manganese, mica, stainless steel, titanium and selenium.

The switch from gold to industrial metals represents the first major project undertaken by the international board, established recently to speed the mobilization of North American resources and coordinate economic defense efforts.

While the plan does not contemplate the cessation of Canadian gold production, officials said that Canadian manpower and machinery would be diverted in an increasing degree to production of the strategic metals.

Brazil Halts All Foreign Newspapers

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 1 (P)—President Getulio Vargas extended today a decree halting foreign language publications in Brazil, giving them 30 more days to change over to Portuguese or to suspend publication. The extension ends "unalterably" August 30.

The decree ordering "nationalization" of about 50 newspapers and periodicals within six months was issued last January.

Peru Agrees to End Hostilities

QUITO, Ecuador, Aug. 1 (P)—Diplomatic representatives of the United States, Argentina and Brazil told the people of Ecuador by radio yesterday that Peru had agreed to end hostilities with Ecuador at 6 p. m. tonight and that Ecuador therefore was cancelling orders mobilizing new military classes.

NAZI WRITER FINDS RUSSIA DRY COUNTRY

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Hans Hufsky, a reporter in one of the German army's propaganda companies known as "PKS," has produced one of the most descriptive pieces concerning the soldier's plight and thought on the Russian battlefield that has come to the attention of American correspondents in Berlin.)

(Like all German reporters, Hufsky, 28, was not sent to the front as a war correspondent, but was drafted as a soldier, assigned to a propaganda company and sent into battle with the rank of an officer. Occasionally engaged in action, several of these PKs men have been killed.)

(Before the war Hufsky was editor-in-chief of Junges Deutschland, a magazine for girls in the high teens. His story, sent through normal channels to the high command for approval and then to Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, is titled "The Campaign Without Water.")

WITH THE GERMAN ARMY ON THE EASTERN FRONT, Aug. 1.—This war is the driest of all wars.

That is because it leads east too few water mains, fewer than in Poland and fewer than in France.

Flap down your dust-coated eyelashes, comrade, and think back—think of France: Wasn't that then one vast water fountain compared with this country?

Yesterday we passed a village as we rolled along the marching route of our panzers. For hours before we had located it on our map: Now it must still be 10 kilometers away, now only five, now just one more—there it was, the village—there was the first house and there, too, was the first bucket-well.

Down deep with the pall—up it came with mire and mud. On to the next well! It yielded only a brownish broth.

The wells already had been drawn dry by our comrades. So once again we cannot wash ourselves tonight. Wash? why for Heaven's sake, we haven't the faintest intention of washing, there isn't water for that. All we want is to just dip our hands once, just to cool our burned brows and necks a bit.

This morning we were to drive through the city of "M" (obviously Minsk). We figured it out: There must be so and so many hydrants, for drinking, for cooking, for washing, for filling our field flasks.

California Counties Get Gas Tax Funds

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 1 (P)—The largest second quarter allocation of state gasoline taxes ever made — \$4,471,482 — was distributed today to California counties by Controller Harry B. Riley.

The apportionment of the tax funds is based on the total registration of motor vehicles in the individual counties.

Del Norte county, with 2008 registered vehicles, received \$10,201; Siskiyou, with 12,333, \$24,095, and Modoc, with 3893, \$12,738.
