FCC Acts to Force Two Publishers to Attend Hearing

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (AP)—Chairman James L. Fly today ordered the legal staff of the federal communications commission to take steps to force two newspaper publishers to testify at the inquiry into newspaper ownership of radio stations. Fly's order came after Elisha Hanson, counsel for the American Newspaper Publishers association, told the commission for the second time that it was conducting an unlawful and illegal inquiry and that he had advised the publishers not to appear. Those facing FCC action were Edwin S. Friendly, business manager of the New York Sun, and James G. Stahlman of the Nashville (Tenn.) Banner, former president of the Publishers association. Stahlman now is on active duty with the navy as a lieutenant commander. Names of the two publishers were called as the commission began its hearing today and Hanson stepped forward to pronounce that the men had been advised to ignore several subpoenas served on them by the FCC.

NLRB HEARING ON MILL CASE ENDED

A national labor relations board representation hearing on the Crater Lake Box and Lumber company case, second of two such proceedings in the city in as many days, wound up shortly after noon Friday in the county courthouse.

The hearing was held on a Lumber and Sawmill Workers' union petition that they be named as bargaining agent for the firm's employees. Intervening in the case was the International Woodworkers of America (CIO), which also claim a number of the workers as members. It was considered probable the board would order an election, usual result of a disputed claim, on the basis of Friday's testimony.

Testimony of G. C. Lorenz, president of the company, occupied most of the session. Lorenz related past events in the firm's relationship with labor. Both the AFL, represented by J. G. Wolf, and the CIO, for whom George Brown acted as agent, agreed on what should be the bargaining unit roster and on supervisory exclusions.

Findings of the board examiner, William E. Babcock, will be announced later, probably along with those of the Klamath Timber company case, heard yesterday.
