

ENLARGED DRUG STORE TO OPEN HERE SATURDAY

Formal opening of Klamath Falls' largest drugstore, "Everybody's," is scheduled for 8 o'clock Saturday morning at 808 Main street, it was announced by the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Whisenant.

"Everybody's," established here several years ago and enlarged within the past two months to result in as modern and up-to-the-minute a drugstore as is to be found in southern Oregon, now has absorbed the space previously occupied by Schoen's bakery, giving the store a space of 36 feet in width and 80 feet in length.

Light was the primary requisite sought by Mr. and Mrs. Whisenant when they planned the enlargement of "Everybody's."

Over the entire floor space has been laid a white and black marbled linoleum. The showcases stress the all white motif, and all white walls and ceiling reflect the lighting of white

Announcement of the handling of DuBarry beauty products was made by Mrs. Whisenant who has just returned from Portland where she completed a course in the uses of the cosmetics, well known nationally. On the mezzanine is an all-white room to be used by Mrs. Whisenant in demonstrating the DuBarry line.

The complete Rust Craft greeting card line, cards for every single occasion, is placed in a convenient rack at the front of the store with the leather goods nearby. Sundries and medicines take up the remainder of the space in well equipped shelves and on open shelves placed on the floor.

The prescription department, handled by Whisenant, is in the rear of the building with an open window for dispensing purposes.

Assisting Whisenant in this department is R. B. Hamilton. Isabelle Williams will assist in the cosmetics, Mary Sacher is in charge of the tobacco and pipe department, and Mrs. Orville Hamilton is general assistant.

The Whisenants will observe the opening of "Everybody's" by presenting each woman with a gardenia and each child with a balloon.

Cheaper Meats Often As Nutritious As Better Cuts When Well Cooked

Always remember this: Low-cost cuts of meat have as much nutrition value as the more expensive ones. Remember this, too: by careful cooking and by using the best recipes, you can make a low-cost meat dish taste not only different but tender and succulent. Try these combinations and prove it:

PORK ROLLS WITH APPLE-CELERY STUFFING

(Serves 4 to 6)
Two pounds pork blade steak, boned, apple-celery stuffing, 3 tablespoons flour, 3 tablespoons lard, salt and pepper, 1 cup boiling water.

Have pork cut in 1/2 inch slices. Cut into pieces for individual

servings as nearly 2 by 4 inches in size as possible. Place a spoonful of stuffing on each piece, roll and fasten edge with toothpicks. Dredge with flour and brown on all sides in hot lard. Season. Add one cup boiling water. Simmer until done, about 45 minutes. Add more boiling water if necessary.

APPLE-CELERY STUFFING
Two slices salt pork, 1 cup chopped celery, 1/3 cup chopped onion, 3 tart apples, 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 cups dry bread crumbs, 1 cup chopped parsley, 1 cup milk, salt and pepper.

Dice pork and fry crisp. Remove cooked pieces. Cook celery and onion in pork fat for 3 minutes. Core and slice apples. Add apples to celery mixture, sprinkle with sugar and cover. Cook slowly until tender. Add crumbs, diced pork, parsley, milk and seasoning. Mix well.

CUSHION LAMB SHOULDER WITH FRUIT STUFFING

(Serves 4 to 6)

Lamb shoulder, fruit stuffing, salt and pepper.

Have bone removed from lamb shoulder. Sew on three sides to form a pocket. Dust inside of pocket with salt and pepper. Pile fruit stuffing lightly into cavity. Sew up edges or skewer and lace with string. Place meat on rack in an open roasting pan in low (300° F.) oven and bake for 35 to 40 minutes. Serve on hot platter with border of cooked buttered broccoli, mounds of cooked carrot straws and parsley.

FRUIT STUFFING

Two cups bread crumbs, 6 cooked apricots, diced, 6 cooked prunes, diced, 1 small orange, seeded and chopped, 1 egg beaten light, salt and pepper.

Combine and mix well.

Huge Supply of Coffee Consumed by Trainees

FORT MASON, SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Aug. 1 — Mrs. Housewife might buy her coffee for the family's next morning breakfast at the corner grocery the night before, but Col. F. J. Riley, quartermaster supply officer at Fort Mason, San Francisco, buys coffee for the army on a somewhat larger scale, and has to arrange his supply more than a few hours in advance.

To make sure that U. S. troops in Alaska and in several military posts of the ninth corps area have their fresh cup of coffee each morning during September, invitations have been issued today by the quartermaster supply officer at Fort Mason for bids on coffee to be opened August 12 and August 13. Coffee for the Alaskan posts of Fort Richardson, Annette Island landing field, Ladd field at Fairbanks, Dutch Harbor and Seward, Alaska,

will be bought on bids to be opened at 10 a. m. (PST) Wednesday, August 13, at Fort Mason. Deliveries to be F.O.B. Seattle, Wash. Quartermaster Depot within 10 days of awarding contract. A total of 29,655 pounds of coffee is to be bought for use in Alaska during September.
