

### NO SUMMER LAG SEEN IN TRADE

NEW YORK, Aug. 1 (P)—Business activity continued at high levels this week with no evidence of the normal summer slackening, Dun & Bradstreet said today in the weekly review.

"Bolstered by heavy buying of hard goods," the agency said, retail trade continued at exceptionally high levels for this time of year. Reflecting increasingly brisk, reflecting increasingly the rising tendency of industry was tempered only by actual and potential threats of supply shortages. As July ended, output showed no more than a minor drop from its level a month earlier.

The review placed retail volume at 20 to 24 per cent ahead of last year, with a minor fraction of the advantage accounted for by price increases. Again the south led the country in percentage improvement, the increases for the entire region being estimated at 28 to 32 per cent.

Gains for other sections were: New England 20 to 25 per cent, east 18 to 23, middle west 22 to 28, northwest 16 to 20, southwest 25 to 30 and Pacific coast 17 to 22.

On the wholesale front the agency found fall market events, which started off with a rush several weeks ago, continuing under heavy buying pressure. An instance was the opening of "Market week" at Denver, where early commitments were more than 50 per cent more than 1940. At the apparel show at Seattle, the review stated, some exhibitors reported orders two and three times higher than last year.

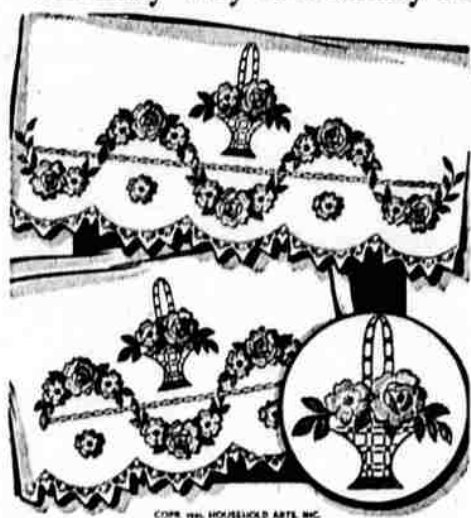

### Saving Surplus Foods From Garden for Defense Urged

No food produced this summer and fall should be allowed to go to waste, warns the office of emergency management. In nearly every community, there are surpluses of fruits and vegetables which should be stored or canned, not only for individual family needs, but for the needs of everyone in the community as well.

Women who are eager to do something, should study these recommendations of the OEM: "Appraise community needs and distribute these surpluses, whether in fresh or preserved form, by such methods as school lunch and playground lunch programs, community kitchens for families in congested defense areas, or other ways of meeting the nutritional needs of families with small incomes.

"Appraise facilities and make necessary arrangements for collecting, storing, canning, drying or otherwise preserving, according to safe standards, such of these products as are not used in fresh form."

The demand this year for commercially canned goods will be greater than last year because of increased consumer buying power, army purchases, and shipments under the lend-lease program.

If commercial supplies can be supplemented by non-commercial storage and preservation, it will help to meet consumer needs and will contribute toward price stability.

Non-commercial supplies are available in many localities. In addition to farmers' small surpluses not raised for the commercial market, there are products which are not utilized for commercial marketing or canning but are excellent food. After commercial picking, tomatoes and fruit such as apples, peaches and pears are frequently available if means can be found to gather and can them. Discretion should be exercised as to the nutritive value of food canned and emphasis should be placed on the foods of high nutritive value.

Has your community organized an agency composed of local members and some advising expert from the state nutrition committee? If not, why not call a group together and organize such an important factor in national defense today in your own community? The time is short.
