CANBY-HATFIELD ROAD BIDS NEAR

TULELAKE — Bids for construction of a stretch of the Canby-Hatfield highway to begin 10 miles north of Canby and extending to the forest boundary near Stronghold will be opened Aug. 8 in San Francisco, according to word reaching here from J. E. Elliott, supervisor of the Modoc national forest.

The road will be engineered by the federal works administration in compliance with national defense requirements, specifications calling for a 24-foot width of paving with a permanent base. Oil sprays will be used between layers of surfacing material for binding and the construction is reported to be of the most permanent type obtainable. A 10 1/2 mile stretch between Canby and Howard Gulch is now nearing completion.

Work on three concrete bridges which will be built between the Modoc-Siskiyou county line and Stronghold will begin probably the first of next week. Construction cost will probably reach \$300,000 and the stretch when completed will be taken over by the state highway department for future maintenance.

Completion of the road will relieve Modoc county of a financial burden and will remove one of the worst driving hazards in northern California.

Linked with highways south through Susanville and Alturas, the highway when completed will provide the third major federal defense link between northern and southern Pacific coast points.

William Rhodes Davis, 52, Well Known Oilman, Dies
HOUSTON, Tex., Aug. 1 (P) — William Rhodes Davis, 52, internationally known oilman, died today.

Last January he figured sensationally in a statement by Verne Marshall, chairman of the no foreign war committee, that Davis once carried to the United States a Nazi offer to negotiate an "honorable and just" peace with Germany's foes.

Davis replied immediately he did wish to do all he could in the interests of peace but "I resent the inferences that I am engaged in any activity inimical to the best interest of my country."

He also said "I have kept the United States department of state fully informed of my activities."

PRESS, RADIO EXEMPTED IN NEW TAX BILL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (AP)

Congressional tax authorities said today that newspapers and radio stations were specifically exempted from excise taxes proposed in the new tax bill on leased wires and long distance telephone calls, provided they use these facilities either for the collection or dissemination of news.

The same exemptions are included in existing law, they said, but are being written into the new tax measure to avoid confusion because certain leased wire circuits, such as those for burglar alarms, would be subject to the proposed tax of 5 per cent of the amount paid for the service.

The new tax on telephone toll calls, telegraph, cable or radio messages would be levied on those for which the charge is more than 24 cents. The tax would be levied at the rate of 5 cents for each 50 cents or fraction thereof. Treasury experts said the press, radio and similar businesses would continue to be exempt from these taxes as well as from leased wire taxes.

Both newspapers and radio stations will be subject, however, to the proposed tax of 5 per cent on their local telephone bills, congressional attaches said. This levy was recommended by the treasury and written into the \$3,529,000,000 bill by the house ways and means committee.

The exemption from the leased wire and toll call taxes would

apply specifically to the news circuits or services "utilized in the collection of news for the public press or radio broadcasting or in the dissemination of news through the public press or by broadcasting."

Certain types of "news ticker services, stock quotation and information services" would be subject to the leased wire tax. Treasury officials said "news ticker services" had not been finally defined under the bill, but that the tax would not apply to such services when supplied to newspapers or radio stations.

The tax, they said, would be payable by other subscribers.

The five per cent tax on all local telephone bills will not apply to installation or repair charges.

A new tax is proposed in the bill on radio stations and networks. The rates are five per cent on the sale of radio time from \$100,000 to \$500,000 a year, ten per cent on time sale from \$400,000 to \$1,000,000 and 15 per cent on sales over \$1,000,000 a year. A radio station selling less than \$100,000 worth of time a year would be exempt.
