CURFEW FOR OIL SALES TO BEGIN SUNDAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP) — In the face of predictions that the nightly closing of service stations in Atlantic seaboard states would cause unemployment, Secretary of Interior Ickes and the oil industry perfected plans Friday to apply the curfew next Sunday, with more drastic action to conserve motor fuel supplies indicated should this blackout fail.

Oil men accepted the proclamation closing down an estimated 100,000 gasoline stations from 7 p. m. to 7 a. m., seven days a week, as showing Ickes' determination to meet the predicted eastern fuel shortage, even to the extent of adopting rationing, if need developed.

Ickes, who is defense petroleum coordinator, said in announcing the curfew yesterday that if the new step failed to cut consumption precipitately, "it then must be followed by other steps to accomplish our ends."

In New York, Louis Kimmel, manager of the gasoline merchants of Brooklyn and Queens, estimated that the night shutdowns would cost 100,000 men their jobs — 10,000 in Metropolitan New York alone. Further, he said he believed the curfew could not be made fully effective without a government order.

Cooperation on Defense Labor Urged by Arens

EUGENE, Aug. 2 (P) — The solution to the problem of labor for defense work must be solved by "practicing cooperation" not just talking it, L. O. Arens, state unemployment commissioner, told representatives of five governmental agencies at the concluding session of their conference here today.

Arens pointed out that "democracy is doing things the hard way," combating greed, apathy and fear without the use of force. He gave credit to the employment service for becoming the "clearing house" for all agencies striving to provide needed defense workers.

Laurin Hinman, assistant area OPM director, also stressed the need for perfect cooperation at the closing session of the group. He said "no big stick" was being used, but that the problem was being met in the democratic manner.

Earlier the group discussed an announcement by L. C. Stoll, state employment director, that a mobilization census of women and youths would take place within the next few months. The announcement followed reports from employment officials concerning apparent and expected shortages of needed defense workers.

Aged Man Keeps Death Rendezvous

TACOMA, Aug. 2 (P) — Oscar Runstein kept his rendezvous with death today.

A letter received this morning by Undersheriff Clyde Knowles read:
"Will you please send an ambulance to my home Saturday morning. You will find my body right behind the house where I live all alone."

Two deputy sheriffs kept the appointment and found the body, shot with a rifle. They said Runstein, about 70, had pinned a note to himself, reading "This is strictly a suicide."

RED LOSS BIG IF LENINGRAD FALLS, CLAIM

Berlin's quiet insistence during the past 24 hours that Leningrad is about to fall compels our attention.

This former glittering capital of the Czars is the second city of all the Russias, and one of the most important of the soviet defensive centers. Its loss would be a grave blow to the bolsheviks and would create an immediate threat to the entire structure of the Stalin defenses.

Thus while we shall be well advised to regard the situation with reserve, pending developments, the matter is insistent enough to call for a re-examination of what it will mean if the Hitlerites and their Finnish allies do get possession of this great industrial city of 3,200,000 inhabitants. Here are some vital points for consideration:

Leningrad is Russia's sole remaining port on the Baltic. It is the bridge-head for a network of railroads which extend into the country in all directions.

Capture of Leningrad would cut the soviet union off from its naval forces in the Baltic altogether, leaving this homeless and wandering navy to the mercy of German men-of-war and bombers.

Not only does Leningrad give Russia her all-important access to the Baltic, but it is one of the greatest industrial centers of the soviet. Here among many other products are manufactured munitions of war, machines of all sorts, chemicals and rubber.

But apart from what Leningrad means in itself, its capture would at once produce the menace of a German-Finnish turning movement against the Stalin line, which has its right flank anchored on the port of Leningrad. This menace would be multiplied if the nazis at the same time pressed their assault on the center of the Stalin line in the Smolensk area.

Now, of course we don't know what the plans of the Russian command are to meet such a situation. It would be a seven days' wonder, however, if the nazis hadn't worked out a very definite line of strategy.

Having foreseen war with Germany, they have for years been preparing for just such an

emergency. We have seen the effects of that preparation in the great resistance they have made thus far. We shall get a further view of prospects as the battle of Leningrad develops.

So far as concerns the defense of the city proper, it is supposed by foreign military circles to be a giant fortress, but naturally details are lacking. Certainly it is no secret that it is defended on the Baltic side by the great naval base of Kronstadt, which is heavily fortified.

The land side of the metropolis is understood to be guarded by strategically placed fortifications and artillery. Apart from this the entire manpower of the city has been trained for eventualities, and the forces of the regular army and air fleet there must be very strong.

The bolsheviks likely would pull back to the line of the Volkhov river, which empties into Lake Ladoga some 75 miles east of Leningrad. For the purpose of keeping the front straight, the bolsheviks might retire to the line of the Volkhov clear down through Novogorod to the Pskov sector. Upon which the movement would pivot. In other words, the nazis would swing the entire northern end of their line back like a door which was hinged near Pskov.

Stanley stopped in Klamath Falls Friday night en route to the lake to complete plans for the outing. He said he didn't expect the crowd to be large but that he had been assured of a representative turnout from all the member counties.

The picnic will be held at the south beach of the lake at 1 p. m., where tables will be set up for those bringing their lunch. Registration headquarters will be at the resort. The public is cordially invited to attend the picnic and join in the old-fashioned get-together and entertainment, Stanley said.

MOVIE HERO JOINS LONDON EMBASSY

LONDON, Aug. 2 (AP) — Robert Montgomery, American motion picture actor, arrived in London Friday in the uniform of a naval lieutenant as the latest addition to the growing staff of naval attaches at the United States embassy.

Montgomery, who served for a time as a volunteer ambulance driver in France during the German offensive there a year ago last spring, landed in England last night after a trip aboard a bomber from Newfoundland.
