

# BANKER TELLS BUSINESS TO BE VIGILANT

Because of the uncertainties that confront the business world today, it is the opinion of Mitchell Tillotson, cashier of the Klamath Falls branch of the First National Bank of Portland, that above all things business men should not relax vigilance over their own affairs.

Tillotson was the guest speaker before the Klamath Realty board at the regular meeting of that organization Monday at noon, in the banquet room of the Willard hotel.

In an informal talk the speaker declined to assume the role of a prophet as to the portents of the future. The similarity of the conditions that prevailed in 1914 and 1938, on the outbreak of war was pointed out, with the effect of war time conditions on capital goods. He declared that there are too many uncertainties to permit one to draw any definite conclusions from the trends shown by graphs and charts, and that the only premise from which to start is that one doesn't know very much about what the future is to reveal.

"Take care of normal needs, but don't overbuy. Remember that inventories may be built up to where we may take an awful beating. We must give careful consideration to the problems of building up our inventories beyond what we regard as necessary for proper conduct of our business, and keep careful control department of our enterprise," said Mr. Tillotson.

The opinion was expressed that business men have a very definite job to do, and with so many uncertainties to confront as compared with the few certainties. One of the certainties is higher taxes, and provision will have to be made to pay these taxes. We need to make more intensive study of our own affairs. Things are moving rapidly these days and next week there may be a man come along to tell us that a ceiling has been placed on prices of some of the goods carried in present inventories, as has been done with automobile manufacturers. It was also pointed out that the real estate business has its own problems, and the duty of the realtors too was emphasized.

In substance, Tillotson advised that in his judgment business should not make any undue expansion, and should confine its activities to sound practice, make debts nominal, and extend capital debts while it can be amortized. In other words proceed as usual, but with the purpose of getting our house in order and having our financial affairs in shape for whatever may come, and take care of old customers who will be patrons of the future, and observe caution in taking on customers that are not known.

the French empire and particularly in Africa.

The German controlled Paris press today professed to see the hand of United States Ambassador William D. Leahy behind "the brake applied to the policy of French-German collaboration."

SALEM, Aug. 4 (P)—The \$320,000,000 defense highway act, vetoed by President Roosevelt today, would have given Oregon \$2,045,000 for strategic highways and more than \$2,000,000 for access roads to defense industries and military reservations.

If congress changes the bill to comply with President Roosevelt's request that he be permitted to allocate the money, there is no way of telling how much the state would receive. Highway commission officials said the amount might be more or less.

MEDFORD, Aug. 4 (P)—R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, advised of the president's veto of the \$320,000,000 defense highway act, said Monday.

"The veto checkmates proposed improvements of the Pacific highway and access roads to army camp areas, for which extensive plans have been prepared. It was planned to use the anticipated defense road funds to augment state funds on hand, on the projects."

# RYNERSON TALK HIGHLIGHT OF AFL SESSIONS

An intense two-hour discussion of hospitalization measures and an address by C. M. Ryner, chairman of the State Industrial Accident Commission, Sunday highlighted an AFL union conference before some 35 basin loggers in the Klamath Labor temple.

Ryner urged in his talk that labor initiate a petition for the next Oregon ballot calling for compulsory coverage of all state workers under the accident commission program. At present, he said placement of accident coverage is left up to the individual employer.

Information on the hospitalization question long a controversial issue, was given by Robert Berven of the National Hospital association, Alfred C. Walsh of the Industrial Hospital association, and Joe Hicks of the Klamath clinic. The AFL has taken the stand hospitalization contracts should exist between the men involved and the hospital agent instead of being handled through the employer as is now the custom.

Organizational addresses by Kenneth Davis, executive secretary of the northwest council of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union; Homer Haney, council president; Mike Pavolka; and Bob Streeter, northern California organizers, occupied most of the afternoon meeting.

Davis urged the assembled loggers to work together in their efforts for better wage and living conditions. He pointed out that whereas the pine industry at one time led the fire belt in wage levels, fir sections now, through organization, have passed the pine areas.

Informal discussion on wage scales, log scaling, living conditions, seasonality, and hospitalization closed the meeting.

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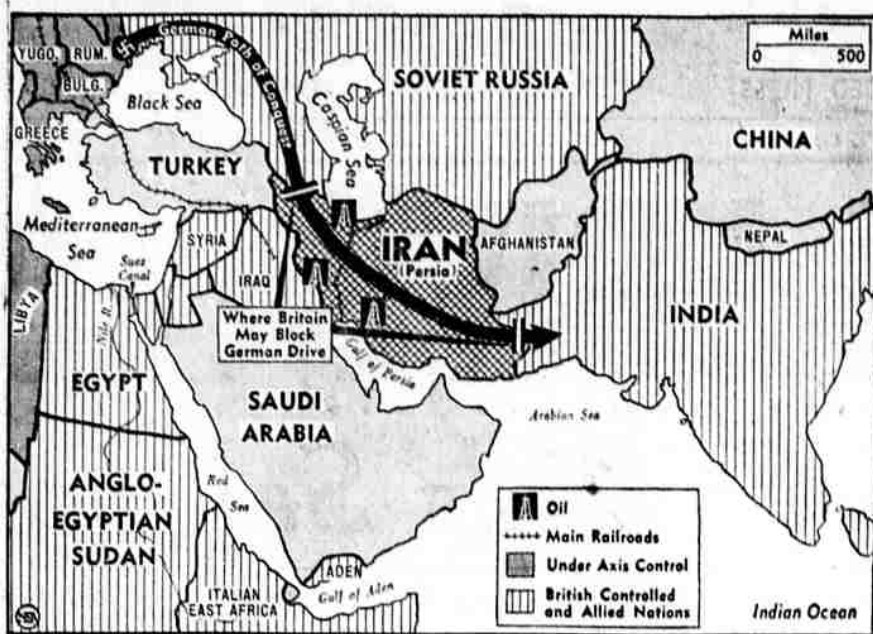
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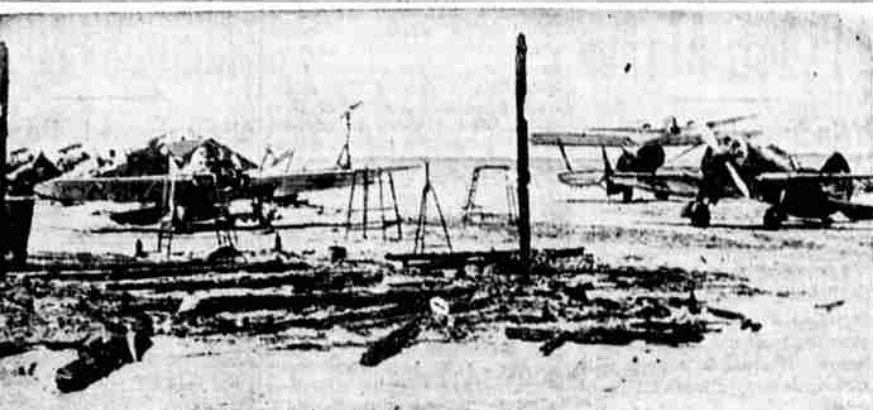
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## Germany's War Heads for Storied Land of Iran

## House Passes Big Defense Tax Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (P)—The house passed and sent to the senate today a \$3,200,000,000 tax bill, virtually tripling the taxes of persons in the medium income brackets, after eliminating a provision requiring married persons to file joint income tax returns.

Rejection of the joint return by a 242 to 160 vote and a lopping of about \$323,000,000 from the bill's total estimated yield came minutes before passage.

The bill, stiffest in the nation's history, would raise approximately \$829,000,000 from individual incomes; about \$1,332,000,000 from corporations through surtaxes and stiffer excess profits taxes, and about \$880,100,000 from new or higher excise taxes on almost two-score commodities or services.

Nine empty shells were found for the gun Green carried, but no check was made to determine what shots—from the revolver or police pistols—killed Monte Brown and Linder. A police guard was placed over Green last night, but no charges had been placed against him. He told officers he came here Saturday from Tampa, Fla.
