In line with the request of the Oregon state board of aeronautics to Mayor Houston, that some civic organization take on the job of painting the existing airmarkers on the buildings in Klamath Falls, the junior chamber of commerce have offered their services. In 1936 the board sponsored a WPA project to paint all the signs in Oregon but at the present time they are in need of repainting and the WPA labor is not to be had.

This work is considered another phase of national defense inasmuch as there are many more military fliers in the air in strange parts of the country. If the airmarker is renewed and instantly visible from the air, it will serve to prevent some young pilot from becoming lost and may even save his life.

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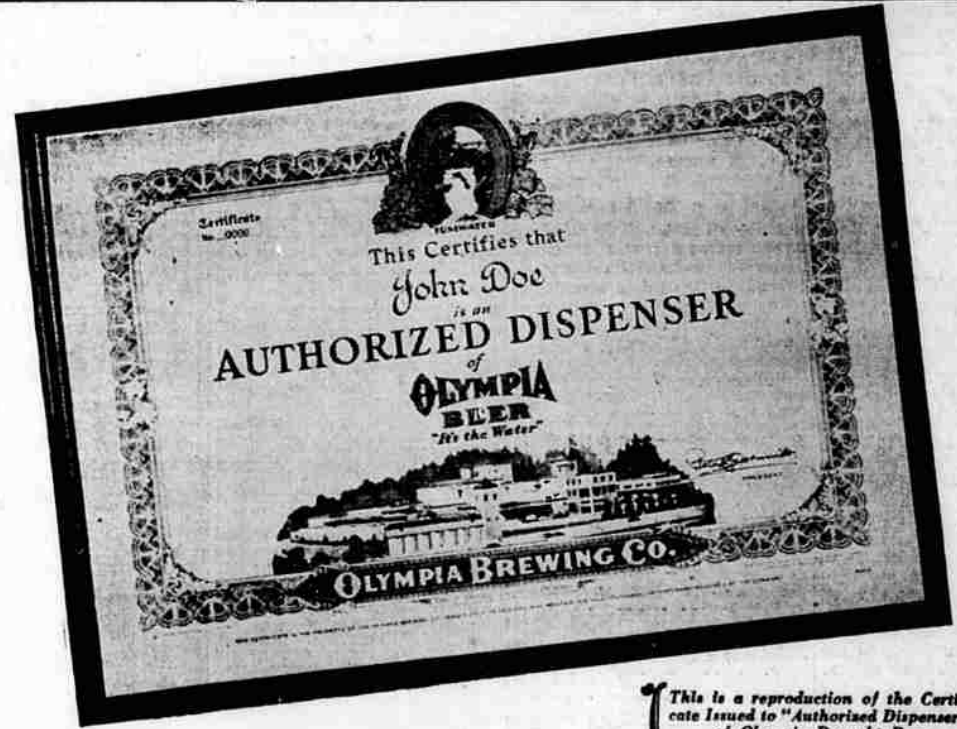

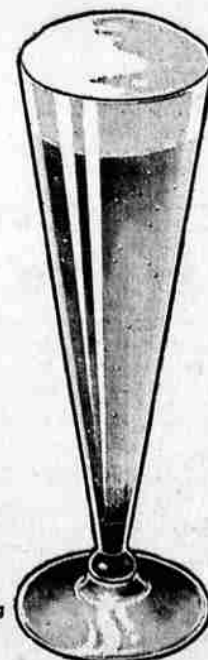
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
