Mahoney Clubs Homer For Locals

Janaso, Davis, Carlstrom Slipped for 16 Hits; Vergex Checks Whitebirds

Oakland's Coast league Acorns, combining power, pitching and Coach Duke Kenworthy, rattled four homers and 12 other bingles off our State Circuit Pelicans last night at Recreation park for an 11-7 exhibition game victory.

Checked for just an inning by Ex-Senator Steve Janaso, the fifth-place Oaks cracked loose in the second as Pete Chapman doubled to left center and scored on Marv Gudat's single through second. Gudat advanced to second on Devaux's infield out and scored as Conroy grounded out to Bishop at second. Corbett's line drive to Bernadou ended the inning with Oakland two runs up.

Rigney Ramps
The bay boys added one in the third when ubiquitous Bill Rigney, the sophomore shortstop with the graduate arm, singled to left and romped home on Chapman's triple to deep center. In the fourth Dunn doubled off the centerfield boards, waited while Hooks Devaux flew out to Paul Crapo at first, then counted ahead of Big Bill Conroy who plastered one over the left field fence. In between out Duesabou and Rigney singled but expired as Luby fanned.

The Whitebirds threatened in their portion of the fourth when Manager Ernie Bishop walked following Mahoney's fly ball to leftfielder Gudat, went to second on a fielder's choice and to third on an error. He perished there when Jack Lloyd grounded to Luby at second.

Stopped in the fifth, the Class AA team went to work again in the sixth. Conroy walked and scored on Duesabou's two-bagger. Rigney made it three with a cleaner-upper over the left prairie fence. Here Kenworthy, fat, forty, and good-humored, took the stand for a moment, but only that. He fled out to Crapo for the second killing and Chapman grounded to Bernadou to end it.

In the latter section of the same canto, the Bigbills matched the three with a trio of their own against the softening slants of Manager Johnny Vergex, who took over in the fourth. Jack Mahoney opened the business with a smashing triple to right, then scored on Bishop's double to the same spot. Crapo walloped a triple to center, lingered while Peterson walked, then dashed homeward as Messrs. Rigney, Luby and Dunn conspired to knock off Big Pete and Lloyd in a single action. Bernadou closed it with a fly ball to center.

Carl Snavely Named To Halt Chi Bear T

CHICAGO, Aug. 6 (AP)—Carl Snavely of Cornell has been nominated as the next football coach to devise a means of bottling the powerful T-formation man-in-motion offense.

Snavely accepted appointment yesterday as head coach of the college All-Stars who will play the Chicago Bears, pro champions, in Soldier Field August 28. The Bears won the title last fall with the man-in-motion attack just as Stanford ran through a stiff schedule undefeated with the same type of offense.

The All-Stars will report next Sunday to Snavely and his aides—Fritz Crisler of Michigan, Lynn Waldorf of Northwestern, Babe Hollingbery of Washington State and Homer Norton of Texas Aggies. The collegians, headed by Michigan's Tom Harmon and Forest Evashevski, will practice at Northwestern while the Bears will condition themselves at Delafield, Wis.

George Halas, president and coach of the Bears, always has predicted victory for his club, which tied and defeated the All-Stars in two previous clashes. He will be assisted by Clark Shaughnessy, Stanford coach, and his own staff—Hunk Anderson, Paddy Driscoll and Luke Johnsos.

SALEM, Aug. 5 (AP)—Salem baseball fans began to wonder today whether their team, the Senators of the Western International league, is in the wrong league.

HOLLYWOOD, August 5 (AP) Remember June 25, you Coast league baseball fans? Probably not, but the Hollywood Stars do.

That's the day Johnny Bassler signed as a twink coach. The Stars have done quite well since, and sports writers and fans are heaping praise on the modest Bassler.

Hollywood was sixth in the standings, with 32 won, 42 lost record and was 20 games back of pace setting Sacramento on June 25.

Then came Bassler. The Stars have the best record of any coast league outfit since that date. They began by bowling over the Sacs themselves, five games to two.

Then in this order they rode through San Francisco 5-3, Los Angeles 5-2, Oakland 4-3, Los Angeles again, 4-3 and Portland 2-1.

Seattle finally held them even 2-2 over the week end, but the Stars haven't dropped a series in six weeks. They've met every rival except San Diego in that span.

Twenty-seven victories against 16 defeats in that six weeks shot the Stars from sixth to fourth place and gave them a winning average of .628.

There will be heroes aplenty on the St. Louis Cardinals team if it wins the National league pennant for 1941, but even at this early date no small share of the season's honors must go to Ernie (Iron Man) White.

White is a southpaw and only 24 years old, yet in his first full season in the major leagues he's involved in a red-hot three-way battle for club pitching honors with veteran Lon Warneke and another rookie, Howie Krist.

White won his 13th game of the season Monday as the St. Louis Cardinals stretched their winning streak to four games with a 4-2 triumph over the Chicago Cubs.

Pittsburgh won its 15th victory in 18 starts by defeating the Cincinnati Reds, 4-1, behind the three-hit pitching of Johnny Lanning.

The New York Yankees increased their American league lead to 12 games by defeating the Washington Senators, 7-5. Steve Peck and Johnny Murphy combined to limit Washington to eight hits.

Jimmy Foxx, back in the lineup after a touch of flu, hit his 18th homer of the year in the ninth inning as the Boston Red Sox no-hit the Philadelphia Athletics, 7-0.

The Brooklyn Dodgers hung on, 13 games behind the Cardinals by trouncing the New York Giants, 11-6 last night before 28,637 at Ebbets field. Seven pitchers, four of them Giants, paraded to the mound in the 22 hit jamboree.

The fish was 9 feet, 11 1/2 inches in length and had a girth of 6 feet, 5 inches.

If pronounced fit, the 22-year-old Cleveland ace will undergo a later test by army doctors before being inducted.

Selective service officials said there was little chance of the Iowan wearing a soldier's uniform before the end of the season. His board 20 number is 2857 and less than 2500 registrants have been classified.

"It's a matter of weeks before he will be classified," Dr. W. L. Townsend, one of the board members, said recently. "We're not even close to Feller."
