MID-SUMMER INERTIA HITS STOCK TRADE

NEW YORK, Aug. 6 (AP)—Mid-summer inertia, plus a little selling in the rail, aircraft and copper groups, gave the stock market a somewhat ragged appearance today.

Tending to check the speculative impulse, brokers said, were fears the far eastern situation was shaping toward a graver phase and pessimistic Wall street sentiment aroused by the heavy bite of income taxes in June quarter earnings statements. On the other hand, continuing inflationary ideas were credited with keeping selling operations under restraint.

Dealings totaled about 500,000 shares.

An isolated weak spot in the share list was United Aircraft, down more than 2. Fractionally in arrears were Boeing, Douglas, Glenn Martin. Consolidated Aircraft countered this trend with a climb to a new 1941 top.

WHEAT RISES OVER TWO CENTS, DROPS

CHICAGO, Aug. 6 (AP)—Wheat prices shot up as much as 2-2 1/2 cents a bushel in early dealings today, reaching four year peaks as high as \$1.19 1/2 for May, 1942, delivery, but then lost about half of the advance due to profit taking.

Purchases of professional interests and commercial concerns, including mills, was stimulated by inflation talk coming from Washington and progress of legislation which would prohibit the government from disposing of approximately 17,000,000 bushels of 1940 grain as long as the war continues.

Other grains advanced with wheat, rye almost 2 cents and corn and oats about a cent at times. Deferred corn and oats contracts reached new four-year peaks near 84 and 47 cents a bushel, respectively.

Wheat closed 1-1 1/2 cents higher than yesterday, September \$1.12 1/2-1/4, December \$1.15 1/2-1/4, May \$1.18 1/2-1/4; corn 1-1 1/2 up, September 77 1/2-1/4, December 80 1/2-1/4; oats 1-1 1/2 higher.

Small quantities of fine Delaine wools have moved at 41 to 43 cents, in the grease. Scattered carload lots of combing, 1 1/2 and 3 bloods, bright fleece wools were sold at 45 to 46 cents, in the grease. A fair demand was being received on fine territory wools at steady prices, compared with sales closed earlier in the week.
