(Continued from Page One) toward a prospective weekend standstill as 675 AFL carpenters prolonged their work stoppage, begun Saturday as a result of a wage dispute with contractors. Nearly half of the 3,100 construction workers were made idle yesterday by the carpenters' absence, and army spokesmen predicted the work would have to be halted completely by the weekend unless the strike is settled. The carpenters are asking a 25-cent increase in the hourly \$1.123 wage scale. A shoulder-to-shoulder blockade of factory gates, set up by CIO pickets, interfered some what with work yesterday at the Aluminum Company of America plant at Cleveland, Ohio, but company officials said production was not seriously hampered. The CIO die-casters union, victor in a recent collective bargaining election at the plant, directed its blockade against 400 AFL and non-union employees. Woodshed Burns — The city fire department was called out at 2:30 p. m. Wednesday when an old woodshed at 422 Front street was reported burning. The structure was destroyed, firemen stated. Small children playing with matches started the flames, it was reported. The foreign office commentator described President Roosevelt as a man who says "I'll feel myself threatened by whomsoever, where, when I am threatened." He said that Portugal had strengthened her military position in the Azores, and that Portuguese dignitaries had visited the islands "to call attention to the fact that Portugal considers the islands an outpost of her sovereignty." "Now apparently in the face of this event, Roosevelt cannot carry through his program of misleading the people with respect to the Azores, so, according to press reports, there are efforts to use Brazil."

(Continued from Page One) The Japanese foreign minister on July 31 of the danger of intervention in Thailand. He said the British government had noted that the Japanese press was using the same kind of language regarding Thailand as it has employed before demands were made for bases in Indo-China. Craigie drew the Japanese foreign minister's attention to this campaign, which has charged that British military preparations are a threat to Japanese interests and that Thailand should come to an understanding with Japan, Eden said. "Our ambassador pointed out that this kind of thing could only mean that some one in authority in Japan is endeavoring to manufacture a case for Japanese intervention in Thailand. This added that if a step of this kind is taken, coming on top of recent action in Indo-China, it must inevitably give rise to the most serious situation between Great Britain and Japan."

Naval minesweepers scouting north of the islands, 25 miles west of the Golden Gate, recovered the body of John C. Gill, 31, radioman aboard the plane.

Japan Predicts U. S. Will Ask Bases in Soviet

TOKYO, Aug. 6 (AP) — The Japanese navy's official spokesman predicted today that the United States would seek bases on Russian soil and said in that event Japan "could not remain unconcerned" since she would consider such bases in the far east a threat to herself. The spokesman, Commander Hideo Hiraide, writing in a popular magazine, said America probably would demand bases on Russia's far eastern coasts in return for aid in the war against Germany.

Late Wednesday afternoon a spokesman for the AGC, in a telephone conversation from Portland, was reported to have waived any objection on the part of that group to a separate contract between the Allied Crafts and Jones and King.
