

## AUTO COMPANY ADDS SERVICE SHOP TO PLANT

With the completion of the new building designed to house the service and lubrication facilities of the company, Lombard Motors bring to Klamath Falls one of the largest and best equipped automotive plants in the city. The new building gives the company 100 feet frontage on South Sixth street and is 154 feet deep, giving them a floor area of 15,400 square feet. It is of brick construction, the same as the original building, and was completed at a cost of about \$8,000, and new automotive equipment to the tune of about \$7000 has been added. The new equipment includes an X-ray motor analyzer, latest type bearing aligners, valve grinders, 3 hoists, and new Alenite high-pressure lubrication equipment.

A complete Dodge and Plymouth parts department takes up one part of the new fireproof building, and another parts room has been added upstairs in the old unit, giving the company one of the largest parts departments in this area. According to L. L. Lombard of the local company, and Dodge officials who have seen the completed plant, it is the largest Dodge sales and service unit in the state outside of Portland, and one of the largest in the Northwest.

### Portland Buildings Too Small to Care For Job Seekers

PORTLAND, Aug. 6 (P)—Portland does not have a building large enough to handle workers swarming in for jobs in the shipyards, Thomas Ray, Boiler-makers' Union secretary, said today.

Labor temple corridors, jam-packed with job-seekers, were ordered cleared yesterday by Fire Marshal Fred Roberts, who said he could hardly get through the crowd into the building, and then found "hundreds more milling inside."

Ray said it was necessary for the men to call every day to determine whether their names had come up for a job. He said about 100 jobs turned up each day.

"If we rented the public auditorium it would soon be packed, and the problem would continue," Ray added.

The electrical workers, carpenters and building trades unions joined in trying to arrange a new system of handling applicants.

### SCHOOL HEAD RAPS TAXATION POLICY

NEW YORK, Aug. 6 (P)—Dr. Rufus D. Smith, provost of New York university, says a "break-the-rich" taxation policy of the federal government may result in closing of private schools.

The pending \$3,206,200,000 tax bill is an application of that policy, he told NYU's assembly on war yesterday, and exemplifies the United States' "chaotic, political and haphazard" approach to a total war economy.

Asserting that population changes, increased taxes and debt have made the problems of school administrators increasingly complex, the educator said the future of private school financing would depend upon "the philosophy of taxation adopted in Washington."

Dr. Smith declared the tax bill now awaiting action by the U. S. senate "strikes inequitably at the great middle class but leaves virtually untouched new income in the lower brackets, thus leaving the throttle open for inflationary tendencies."

Dr. Smith asserted private schools and colleges of the nation depend to a great extent upon the middle class for support, and he predicted that the nation's school system in the future might have to place "greater and greater dependency upon the financial support of the federal government."

"Private education in America has already been hard hit by lessened endowments and lower income returns. Must it now face a depleted middle-class income?" he asked.

### Peace Discussions On in AFL Cereal Workers Strike

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6 (P)—Federal Labor Conciliator Jesse E. Jacobson opened peace discussions with striking AFL flour and cereal workers today.

The employees struck at the Portland Crown mill last week for a 12 1/2-cent hourly wage increase, rejecting a 7 1/2-cent offer. The minimum is now 72 1/2 cents.

Two Seattle and one Tacoma mills closed yesterday in what Duncan Campbell, AFL organizer, charged were lockouts.

"The Seattle and Tacoma men refused to pack containers bearing the label of the struck Crown mills, Portland, but offered to continue their regular work," he said. Plant officials said the men walked out on strike.

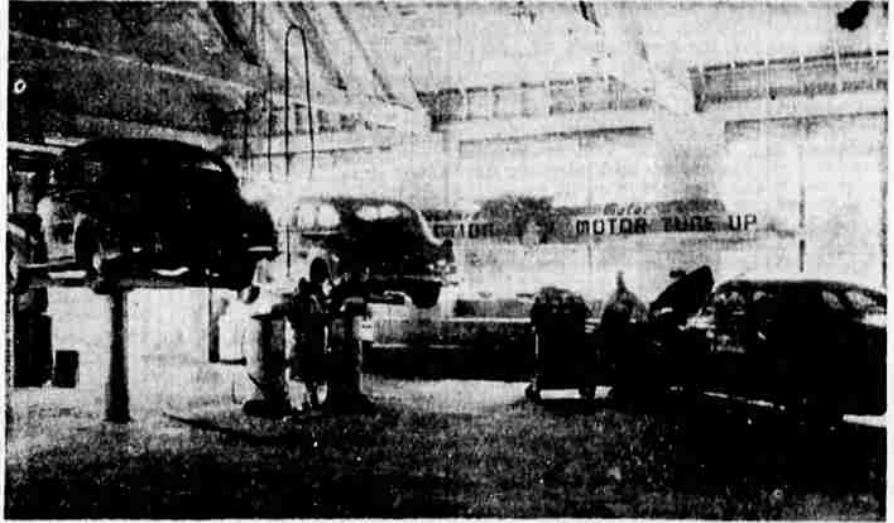

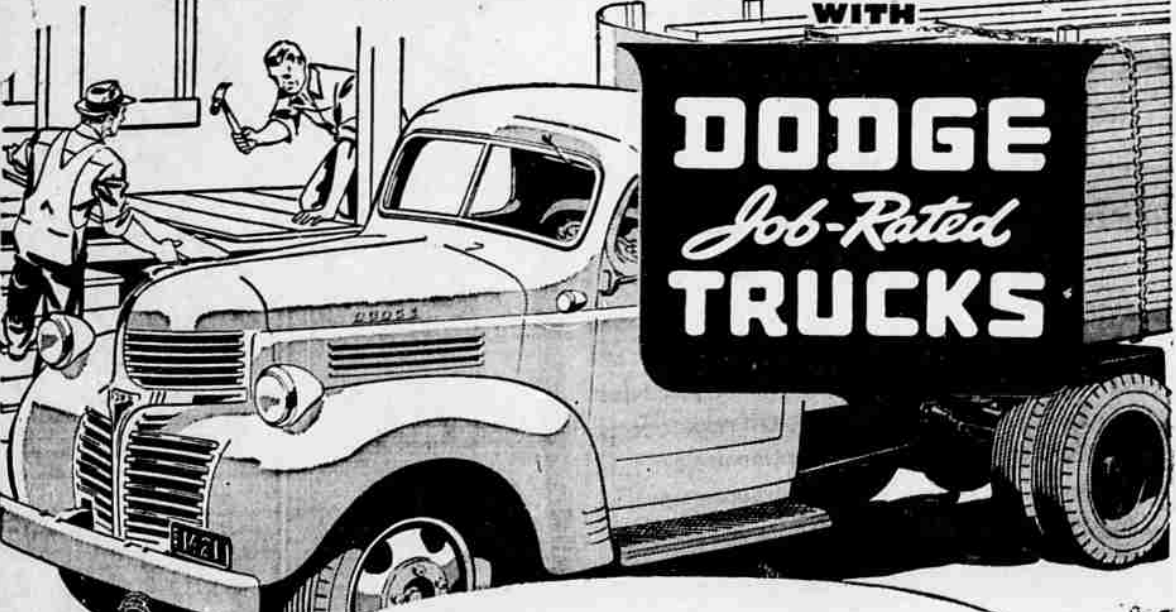
