MAY WHEAT LEADS ADVANCE IN GRAIN

CHICAGO, Aug. 7 (AP)—Buy-
ing centered principally in May,
1942, futures contracts of corn,
which rose more than 2 cents a
bushel at times to a four-year
peak of 86 1/2 cents, led another

general price advance in the
grain pits today.
At one time May wheat and
oats deliveries also established
new highs since 1937, the former
selling up to \$1.10 1/2, but profit
taking held the gains in check.

Corn derived strength from re-
ports of crop deterioration.
Wheat reflected further mill
buying and progress of legisla-
tion which would prevent sale
of government stocks during the
war. Milling trade reports in-
dicated the recent sharp price
rise had resulted in heavy flour
purchases, with nationwide
sales estimated possibly as high

as 2,000,000 barrels the first
three days of the week. This
would be equivalent to more
than 9,000,000 bushels of wheat.

Corn closed about a cent be-
low the day's highs but 1 1/2
cents higher than yesterday,
September 78 1/2 cents, Decem-
ber 81 1/2 cents, May 85 1/2 cents;
wheat unchanged to 1 cent high-
er, September \$1.12 1/2, Decem-
ber \$1.15 1/2; oats 1 1/2 cents up.

STOCKS TRY TO CRAWL OUT OF LOWER LEVELS

NEW YORK, Aug. 7 (AP)—
Stocks tried to crawl out of the
dog house today—on average the
market had been unchanged or
lower since July 28—but many
leaders were unsuccessful.

A handful of specialties ex-
hibited a fair amount of strength
although they were bought only
in dribbles.

Rails were never weak but this
group had to contend with a
contra-seasonal drop in last
week's freight loadings and the
deadlock in the carriers' wage
conference. Transfers approxi-
mated 500,000 shares.

CHINESE HEAR JAPAN MAKES RED REQUEST

SHANGHAI, Aug. 7 (UP)—

Persistent rumors circulated in
diplomatic quarters here today
that Japan has made several re-
quests of Russia, including one
for guarantees that the Soviets
will not give the United States
any bases in the Far East.

The rumors coincided with
reports of travelers arriving
from Dairen that a steady
stream of Japanese troops are
moving into Manchukuo, indi-
cating the possibility that Nip-
pon plans an immediate effort
to occupy the Soviet Siberian
port of Vladivostok as soon as
an expected Russian military
collapse in Europe begins.

According to the diplomatic
rumors Japan has asked Russia
for:

1. Demilitarization of Vlad-
vostok and creation of a de-
militarized zone along the en-
tire frontier of Manchukuo.

2. Economic exploitation of
concessions in Siberia.

3. Guarantees that Russia will
grant no bases to the United
States.

4. More concessions in the
northern half of Saghalien Island
off the Siberian coast. (Japan
owns the southern half of the
island.)

Total strength of the Japanese
armed forces in Manchukuo,
Korea and the Kwantung leased
territory (Dairen), all of which
would be available for opera-
tions against Russia, was esti-
mated at more than 800,000 men
of which about 450,000 are in
central and northern Manchukuo
ready to strike immediately.

(London estimated the number
of Japanese troops in Manchukuo
at the end of last week at
more than 350,000.)

Foreign military intelligence
reports confirmed rumors of
sporadic fighting between Rus-
sian and Japanese forces along
the Manchukuo frontier during
the past three weeks. A num-
ber of wounded Japanese sol-
diers have been brought into
base hospitals at Harbin, North
Manchukuo.

Father Released In Infanticide Case at Roseburg

ROSEBURG, Aug. 7 (AP)—
Paul Hanson, 40, Roseburg, Ore.,
whose wife, Margaret, 37,
is being held on an open charge
after reportedly admitting to
officers that she suffocated her
new-born son last Monday, was
fined \$100 in justice court here
today upon pleading guilty to a
charge of performing a burial
without a permit. District At-
torney J. V. Long reported that
investigation revealed no evi-
dence that Hanson had knowl-
edge that the child lived after
birth. Hanson declared he was
told by his wife that the child
was still-born, and the woman
in her statement said she with-
held from her husband the
knowledge that she killed the
infant, Long stated.

Hanson was accused of bury-
ing the body in a grave dug in
the garden plot adjoining the
Hanson home a short distance
north of the Roseburg city lim-
its. The grave was discovered
by officers Tuesday, after rela-
tives notified them of their sus-
picion that a child had been
buried there, and the body was
recovered.

Mrs. Hanson, who is being
held under 24-hour guard at
the hospital here, informed of-
ficers, the district attorney said,
that she was unattended at the
birth of the child Monday, and
that she suffocated it about 13
minutes after birth.

Joe Beeman, state pathologist,
called from Portland yesterday
for an autopsy, reported to the
district attorney that his finds
revealed the child lived from
15 to 30 minutes.

Long said no formal com-
plaint had been filed against
Mrs. Hanson.

good French combing mane, fine

\$1.03 to \$1.05, scoured basis.

bags were moving occasionally
at prices ranging mostly \$1.00
to \$1.03 for sharp to good French
combing lengths. Medium fleeces
were receiving a few inquiries
but bids were low and only an
occasional small lot was moved.

Prices on combing this blood
bright fleece wool were mostly
in the range, 45 to 46 cents, in
the grease.
