GN Employees Fete Master Mechanic at Big Banquet

Attended by over 70 friends and associates, a big Great Northern banquet Monday night honored E. J. English, master mechanic for the GN, who retired on July 31 after 40 years service with the railroad and 51 years in railroad.

Toastmastered by Paul Hodge, local chairman of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the dinner was highlighted by speeches and testimonials made by representatives of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, Associated Shop Crafts and other friends and fellow employees. Remembrances were presented by the various unions and others.

Superintendent John M. Budd read numerous letters and telegrams from other friends and former associates. UNION MEN PLAN CIO-AFL DEBATES

A series of debates between representatives of the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) and the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union (AFL) for next week, was announced Wednesday by AFL Representative Joe Boyd.

Boyd will speak for the AFL and George Brown for the CIO, he said. The first is scheduled for Tuesday night, August 12, in the city park at Butte Falls, the second for Wednesday night in the Sprague River community hall, and the third for Thursday night in the schoolhouse at the Kesterson logging camp.

Oregon Committee Explains Funds From German Group

PORTLAND, Aug. 7 (P)—A \$20 donation from the German-American War Veterans' association was acknowledged today by Dellmore Lessard, chairman of the Oregon America First committee.

Lessard said the money was accepted after "our committee . . . found this organization was entirely composed of good American citizens of German extraction." He made public an affidavit signed by Richard R. Gorz, captain of the German-American War Veterans' association, stating the association's purpose was to "encourage American patriotism."

Lessard said his presentation of the affidavit was occasioned by recent charges by the American Legion subversive activities research committee that the America First committee "has been supported financially in part by one of the close Nazi front organizations."
