LUMBER HANDS DRAW BIGGEST JOB BENEFITS

SALEM, Aug. 7 — Lumbering and logging workers drew the greatest benefits from the state's unemployment fund during the past three years, but construction employees were the only large group to be paid more than their firms contributed.

An analysis of experience rating charges against 6,984 firms liable to the unemployment compensation act since 1937 shows construction employees drawing \$1,075,800 against \$846,950 taxes. Lumbering and logging workers had benefits of \$3,889,551 against \$4,837,385 in taxes.

These firms, many of which have new experience rates for the last half of 1941, paid in \$22,262,670, out of which \$11,284,577 in benefits was paid. Manufacturing, construction, mining, agriculture, forestry and fishing concerns paid \$10,868,483 or 48.8 per cent of the total, while their employees drew \$7,632,226 or 67.6 per cent of the benefits.

Ranking of the principal industries in their percentage of benefits to contributions as follows: General contractors 162.9; building construction 130; transportation equipment manufacturing (not autos) 122.3; non-metallic mining 96.7; clay products 93.4; trade schools 87.1; special contractors 85.1; lumbering and logging 80.4; recreational 79; furniture manufacturing 78.6; cafes 76.4; apparel manufacturing 76.6; hotels 69.1; mining 52.5; machinery manufacturing 49.4; leather manufacturing 48.9; iron and steel 43.9; personal service 43.4; paper manufacturing 42.6; retail apparel 41.8; retail food 39.9; auto equipment manufacturing 36.4; retail merchandise 36.3; other retail 36.1; retail autos 35.1; trucking 33.8; chemicals 33.8; finance companies 32; filling stations 31.9; non-profit organizations 31.7; medical 30.3; water transportation 30.3; motion pictures 26.2; wholesalers 25; railroads and bus lines 24.9; realty 22.6; printing and publishing 17.4; utilities 14.7; communications 13.3; insurance 12.1; banks 7.1.

Jap Ship With \$3,000,000 Silk Cargo Missing

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7 (UP)—The whereabouts of the Japanese liner Asama Maru, carrying a 3,000,000 cargo of raw silk and 98 passengers, was a mystery tonight after it failed to arrive from Honolulu on schedule today.

The sister ship of the Tatuta Maru was somewhere in the Pacific with its radio silenced and shipping circles speculated the ship might have returned to Japan rather than run into diplomatic complications in American waters.

Normally the Asama's passage time from Honolulu would have brought the ship into San Francisco quarantine at dawn today, but neither the Nippon Yusen Kaisha line, the coast guard nor the marine exchange had sighted the liner or heard from it.
