

BIGGEST WAR MANEUVERS IN WEST PLANNED

 FORT LEWIS, Aug. 6 — Two great west coast army corps—made up of 100,000 men—will receive orders for instant mobilization at the stroke of midnight Saturday, it was learned Wednesday, and the Pacific coast's war maneuvers will be on.

On the stroke of midnight Saturday army officials at Fort Lewis will be given the first warning that the invader—armed with the most modern implements of warfare—has affected a landing and is marching inland.

From the instant the first warning comes through, until about 100,000 men are in the field, the nation will see the greatest emergency mobilization of United States military forces ever held.

It is true that the enemy will be simulated and great battalions will be represented by little squads. And it is also true that officials of the 9th army corps at Fort Lewis and the 3rd army corps in California, know generally what to expect.

But what they do not know is "Where will the enemy land and where will he strike?" And they will not know until Saturday at midnight whether the enemy is making a pincer movement on Seattle or a flanking attack on Portland—two important objectives for any invader.

Great maps hang in the offices of the 9th army corps at Fort Lewis, decorated with pins and marked with arrows, showing all possible routes the enemy might take.

The board of control accepted

the Portland Gas & Coke company's \$2347 bid on gas equipment, and rejected the F. S. Lang company's \$4,406 bid on electric equipment. Warden George Alexander recommended electric equipment because the prison might produce its own power, but the board felt that the legislature might not install new power facilities.
