

Sabin Drubs Bob Riggs on Eastern Grass

RYE, N. Y., Aug. 8 (AP)—Top-seeded Bobby Riggs fell before Wayne Sabin of Reno, Nev., 6-6, 6-3 and Bryan (Bitty) Grant of Atlanta defeated Frank Parker of Springfield, N. J., 6-4, 6-2, yesterday in the eastern grass court tennis championships quarter-final round in Portland, Ore.

Draper's long accurate hitting and his mastery of tough, rolling Lamont greens overcame the handicap of heavy winds. He put together rounds of 34 and 33 for the top spot in the drive for the Seagram gold cup and \$1,000 first money.

Oregon Fishing Prospects

PORTLAND, Aug. 8 (AP)—The state game department's weekly fishing bulletin said today that the north fork of the Umpqua river was at its best and that the McKenzie and Deschutes rivers also offered excellent prospects.

The report by counties included:

LANE—Fair catches of trout reported on McKenzie with best catches in upper river. Lakes in eastern part of the county poor. On the coast, streams have been poor for trout but lakes have been yielding good catches of bass, perch and blue gills.

DOUGLAS—Trout fishing in the North Umpqua is at its best. There is a good run of salmon trout.

JACKSON—Fishing on the Rogue river at its best. Limit trout catches are being taken.

KLAMATH—Odell and Crescent lakes good for trolling and flies in morning and evening. Other lakes good to fair. The North and South forks of the Sprague river have yielded good catches to both bait and flies.

DESCHUTES—Limit catches are being made in Paulina and East lakes. Other lakes generally good to excellent. Nice catches have been made on the Deschutes river below Sheep's bridge.

LAKE—Deadhorse and Blue lakes have been fair. Some fair catches have been made in Dog lake.
